MEXICAN OIL AGAIN.

ONCE more American warships are dispatched to Tampico to protect American interests. The closing of American oil wells rather than their development is the point at issue, but oil, the gold of the Twentieth Century, is as before the basis of the action.

Oil in Columbia, oil in Mesopotamia; oil in the Caucasus; oil in Mexico, oil succeeds gold as that treasure which all the world covets and schemes to possess. Diplomatic gates once opened and closed on "golden hinges moving," but now those hinges move on oil, float on oil, national responsibilities lie in it, the destinies of people are mixed with it.

The next war will be a war for oil. This prophecy has been a diplomatic commonplace since the close of the last war. But while the oil barons may want war, while Mr. Hearst may want war, the people don't want war, and there is no cause for war, as far as Mexico and the United States are concerned.

All that Mexico and the United States need is an understanding. President Obregon can bring about this understanding very simply. All that is required is for him to say officially, what he has repeatedly said informally to incorporate what he declares are the principles of the Mexican government in a treaty of understanding.

This understanding revolves about Article 27 of the Mexican constitution. This provision, if made retroactive, would result in the confiscation of American oil properties in Mexico. Such action would be contrary to all international law, and every code of international conduct in peace.

"I have repeatedly said that this provision will not be retroactively applied," says President Obregon. But when asked to put his statement in writing as a formal pledge to bind himself as president, and his country, when he retires, he refuses to do so.

It is to be hoped that this show of force, may bring the Mexican president to his senses. For while it has nothing to do with the president's action, but is merely a move of precaution to prevent destruction of American property in the Tampico region; in the background lies the fundamental issue.

The president of Mexico can do a great service to himself, a great service to humanity by dropping his policy of evasion and coming out frankly in favor of a treaty of justice and friendship with the United States.
