SENATE WINDBAGS TO BE SHUT UP ON PEACE PACTS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—Backed by assurances of non-interference from President Harding, republican senators today renewed with fresh vigor their campaign for a new senate cloture rule to prevent filibustering and obstructive debate. The principal immediate task before the group of republicans advocating the change in time-honored senate procedure was said to be conviction of a few prominent leaders, notably Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, floor leader. Other influential senators, including Senators Johnson of California; LaFollette, Wisconsin and Borah, Idaho, are opposed to the change. Their objections were said to be based on the ground that restriction of debate by majority vote would deny a small minority the power to delay or defeat what they regarded as vitious measures. They were said to have emphasized that the new rule would have prevented the long debate and "campaign of education" on the Versailles treaty and almost blocked the successful filibuster of the "wildcat twelve" against former President Wilson's armed ship bill.

FIRE 200 ALIENS TO GIVE YANKEES JOBS

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Two hundred alien members of the crew of the George Washington, the largest passenger liner operating under the American flag, were discharged today, in furtherance of the policy of the United States shipping board to have only American crews on American ships which it owns. Similar action will be taken with regard to other shipping board vessels operated by the line, officials said.

Potts, Wilbur Bernas and Albert Randall, all of Grants Pass. They have been putting up the guard rails on the approaches to the different bridges that have been built along the Crater Lake highway, and painting them. They remained from Monday until Thursday night, then going home, but engaged their rooms for next Monday, when they expect to return and apply another coat of paint. Ben J. Trowbridge and C. B.
