"R. J. Rowen must serve three years in the state penitentiary at Salem for a forgery charge committed more than four years ago and on which he was convicted in the circuit court, an appeal to the supreme court of the state having confirmed the findings of the lower court," says the Grants Pass Courier. "His bondsmen have been notified to produce him in order that the sentence may be served. The decision of the higher court was received yesterday. Rowen was indicted by the grand jury on a charge of forgery of a quit claim deed to mining property on the Illinois river, April 2, 1917. Following the indictment Rowen was not brought to trial until January 1, 1920, and received his sentence a week later. The case was again argued and submitted to the supreme court on June 23, 1921. He was released on \$1000 bonds after his trial, nearly two years ago. Mr. Rowen has been employed in Medford as an auto salesman while out on bail awaiting the decision of the higher court."

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RAILROAD MEN VOTE FOR EARLY STRIKE

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—While it was informally stated that approximately 90 per cent of the 186,000 employees of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen have voted to strike, the exact figures will not be announced at once, it was asserted today.

The count of the ballots was completed yesterday and general chairmen were dispatched to report to the general grievance committees. The grievance committee will indicate whether a strike is to be called and the general chairmen will report back here next week.
