ASK COUNTY COURT TO DIVERT FUNDS MEDFORD ARMORY

The directors of the Medford chamber of commerce, because of the desire on the part of the members as expressed on a number of occasions in favor of an armory, requested County Judge Gardner and Commissioners Owens and Bursell to set aside a sufficient fund from next year's taxes to permit the construction of the Medford armory during 1922.

The resolution adopted sets forth that it was not the desire of the directors to have them increase the taxes for this purpose, but that the same be diverted from some one of the other activities of the county that during 1922 could be curtailed without serious effect on the welfare of the people of Jackson county.

The county's share toward the cost of the proposed \$80,000 armory is \$20,000 and approximately \$5500 of this has been set aside during this past year. It is the balance of \$14,500 that it is desired to be made available next year as the city of Medford is prepared to contribute its share of \$20,000 at that time and the state appropriation of \$40,000 has been set aside but cannot be obtained until the city and county match it with an equal amount.

It was the original intention of the county authorities to arrange for the county's proportionate cost of the structure by four annual assessments, but due to there being no adequate quarters for the local National Guardsmen, this request is being made to relieve the situation as soon as possible.

MEN OF PHOENIX TO HAVE SOCIAL MEET

FINAL PLEAS IN RATE CASE ARE FILED

The attorney in charge of the Medford chamber of commerce railroad rate case before the interstate commerce commission, which had a hearing at San Francisco some time ago, reports that insofar as Medford is concerned its case is submitted.

Brief were filed with the interstate commerce commission at Washington, D. C., and with all of the interested parties to the case, so that there is nothing further to be done other than to patiently await the decision of the commission on the question involved.

This last proceeding has cost the Medford chamber of commerce \$250 and a former hearing involved an expenditure of over \$350, but Medford could not afford to drop out of the case and trust to luck on getting what the directors of the chamber believe this city is entitled to.

C. OF C. ASSISTS IN ARMISTICE PLANS

At the request of the Armistice day committee of the Medford Post of the American Legion, the directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce authorized the appointment of a committee to assist the legion in any manner possible to make the ceremony and events planned for the eleventh of November a success.

The committee named by the chamber with the above object in view is John B. Palmer, chairman, A. E. Orr and Al Piche.

NO DISARMAMENT UNTIL THE PACIFIC ISSUES SETTLED

MELBOURNE, Australia, Sept. 30.—Discussion of limitation of armaments at the Washington conference will be impossible without raising the principal phases of the Pacific question, Premier W. M. Hughes said in the house of representatives here today while discussing the conference.

He added it was unnecessary to remind the house that Australia was a Pacific power and that her destiny lay in the Pacific problem, which so far as Australia was concerned, was the problem of Japan, which must expand.

"Talk of disarmament is idle," he added, "unless the causes of armaments are removed. Frankly I see no hope of disarmament until problems relative to the Pacific are settled."

Referring to the imperial defense, Mr. Hughes said that whatever should be decided upon at the Washington conference, Australia must have a naval defense adequate for her safety, and that "peace in the Pacific means peace in the empire."

HOWAT GOES TO JAIL, COAL MINES OF KANSAS CLOSED

COLUMBUS, Kas., Sept. 30.—Hundreds of Kansas coal miners were here this morning to see Alexander Howat and August Dorchy, their president, off to jail.

Half an hour before the time set for Howat and Dorchy to surrender themselves, or continue their liberty by perfecting their appeal to the Kansas supreme court, about 400 miners were scattered around the square. The court house was closed, guards being stationed at the doors.

Howat and Dorchy had the choice of jail or giving bond that they would call no more strikes in the Kansas field. In their statement that they would go to jail, Howat and Dorchy declared that to sign the bond would constitute recognition of the Kansas industrial court, and added: "We are willing to stay in jail until the industrial court law is taken of the statute books of Kansas and the miners of the district are willing to remain on strike until that time if the others miners of the country support them," said Howat.

DELAY PRESENTING CITY PLANNING

Although both the members forum and the directors of the Medford chamber of commerce have approved the idea of establishing a city planning commission in Medford, it was considered inexpedient at this time to appoint a committee to present this request to the city authorities.

In order that every available source of information on city planning might be at hand for the citizens to learn of the objects of a city planning commission, the Medford public library, at the solicitation of the Medford chamber of commerce, secured reference books on this subject which the public may now refer to at any time.

Within a short time, Charles H. Cheney, technical advisor of the Portland City Planning commission, will address the forum on this subject and his talk is guaranteed to be one of the most interesting, instructive and of greatest importance to the future of Medford.

If Medford had had a city planning commission twenty years ago, her streets today would not be such a conglomerated mess as they are now in.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—The New York Giants are the 1921 National league champions. While they accomplished the feat mainly by their own efforts, it remained for the St. Louis Cardinals to give them the final shove that placed them beyond the reach of the Pittsburgh Pirates, no matter what happens in the remaining games.

New York was idle, but the Cardinals, on their own stamping grounds, walloped the Pirates twice yesterday and settled the league championship. But they also created a new possibility—that of tying the Pennsylvanians for second honors. Those two clubs have three more games to play in the present series and if the clouting Cards make a clean sweep they will come to even terms with Pittsburg.

One of Pittsburg's own sons, Bill Doak, pitched St. Louis to victory in the first battle.
