How I Earned My First Dollar

The first dollar I ever earned was driving a bus make in Missouri, when I was about 12 years of age. I was working for a neighbor who ran out of hotel room, and he gave me 10 cents a day. A boy did more work than a man, but got less pay, because I was considered a "kid." My neighbor let me get through by hand to knock in out of his employment. All I had to do was to get up at four o'clock in the morning, sweep the house, milk the cows, get in the wood, harness the mules, feed the chickens, and clean up the kitchen before breakfast. After breakfast, while waiting for the bus to get all the grass I chopped some wood, and washed the breakfast dishes. I worked all day, and a bus to go to school to save the horseback. After supper I did everything I did before breakfast. By working around there I was able to get my first dollar. The horse came and with me up at half past three, and always wanted to know if I was going to take it to bed. I worked all I had \$1.00, and then spent the rest of the winter making the bus drivers. I was paid \$1.00.
