

ORGANIZE RETAIL DIVISION C. OF C. TO AIR PROBLEMS

As a result of a meeting of merchants held at the office of the Medford chamber of commerce there is to be a determined effort made to organize a retail merchants division of the Medford chamber of commerce. Such a department would take care of all of the problems of the retailers which they alone can solve, and which the directors of the chamber of commerce will be relieved from considering.

A series of eight meetings has been planned to be held at the Legion hall, preceding which a dinner will be held. A ticket covering the eight dinner meetings is to be offered to each retail merchant. The first of these series of meetings will be held on October 17 and the last March 6, covering a period of five months.

It is planned to have an interesting program at each meeting dealing with modern merchandising. Another subject of vital importance to the retail dealers that will be taken up is that of donations and questionable advertising propositions.

The retail merchants in attendance at the meeting last evening were John C. Mann, C. A. Meeker, B. W. Paul, A. W. Hubbs, E. E. Wilson and Fred W. Heath. They were appointed as a committee of the Medford chamber of commerce for the purpose of perfecting a retail merchants bureau, but should the merchants decide to have an independent organization, the same would not be in opposition to the views of the directors of the chamber.

GRAND JURY PROBE OF KU KLUX KLAN TEXAS OUTBREAK

WACO, Texas, Oct. 4.—Discussion of Saturday night's clash at Lorena, a small town near here, when ten persons were wounded, three seriously, and Sheriff Bob Buchanan, McLennan county, attempted to halt a parade of Ku Klux Klansmen, continued today.

District Judge Munroe and County Prosecutor Tyrn, were reticent about their plans but it was reported that the calling of a grand jury was probable. Those empowered to call the grand jury were said to be awaiting the outcome of the injuries to Sheriff Buchanan, Ed Howard, a local policeman, and Louis Crow, a laundry proprietor, who are the most seriously hurt.

Unofficial investigators have been informed that the people of Lorena profess to have no knowledge of who fired the shots which wounded Sheriff Buchanan and several bystanders.

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 4.—District Judge S. G. Taylor yesterday charged the grand jury of the 45th district court to make a complete investigation of the Ku Klux Klan and determine whether its purposes and activities are lawful. He instructed the jury to return indictments if any violations were found.

EAGLE POINT EAGLETS

W. H. Crandall, one of our prominent citizens and orchardists and Green Mathews, another one of our well-to-do citizens and capitalists were transacting business in our town Monday and so was C. E. Bellows and wife who came in to bring their cream. I have noticed that there is a marked difference in the way of doing business now and the way it was done a few years ago before the dairy and poultry business started on a business basis, when the farmer kept a few common scrub cows and a few common mixed breed hens with no refer-

ence to the milking quality of the cows or the laying quality of the hens, but now there seems to be a general feeling of pride to be sure to get the best of everything in these lines and the result is that under this system those who have been devoting their energies in that direction are out of debt and are on the high tide of prosperity, and now it is a very common sight to see our farmers come in on the set days for the creamery men to be here, to gather the cream and eggs, a half dozen or more at a time to meet them, take their checks, go to the bank and get the cash, or else deposit it and have it drawing interest, and instead of being forced to patronize a certain store or firm, because they have a bill there they can go and trade where they please. I can remember from ten to fifty years ago when if a man owed a bill at a store and went to another store to buy goods that he was soon notified to come and settle up and if he didn't would be sued and put to cost. I full well remember some years ago when a merchant who was then doing business in Jacksonville elected a man to an important office, assessor, because he held his note for six hundred dollars by forcing his customers who were in his debt to vote for him; that was under our old system of voting viva voce. And he made so many mistakes that it took a long time to straighten his work out. I remember one instance where he assessed a man on Foothills creek and the assessment should have been three thousand dollars and he reported it as three million and a friend of his discovered the mistake, and let him, the man assessed, know in time to correct it before it was turned over to the sheriff.

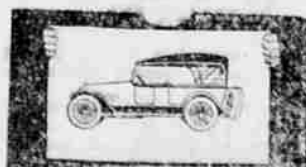
