NEW SCHOOLROOM AT ROOSEVELT TO OPEN TOMORROW

The new room at Roosevelt will open Thursday morning in charge of Miss Odell Erb of Ellensburg, Wash.

A large number of 3B and 4B pupils from Miss Dunham's and Miss Mickey's overcrowded rooms at Washington school have been transferred to this room. Miss Mickey's 4th grade room having 56 and Miss Dunham's 73 before any transfers were made. A few 3A pupils are being sent also. These will go to Miss Wilson's room. No 4A pupils will be transferred, since there is no 4A class in that building. Nor are there classes of 3A or 4A in Jackson school.

The plan of sending these pupils to Roosevelt was adopted by the board only after considering and rejecting as not feasible several other plans. These included part-time schemes, renting or building additional room at Washington and other plans. If suitable accommodations could have been secured near Washington, that plan would certainly have been used.

Arrangements have been made with the Interurban company to have a bus leave the Washington building at 8:40 each morning. There will be a 50 fare, which the child will be expected to pay each trip. This bus will also leave Roosevelt in the afternoon at 4:40, going directly to the Washington school grounds. Arrangements may be made for a corresponding trip at noon if enough parents desire their children to come home at noon for lunch, and make requests for such services.

It is not compulsory that any child use the bus, but he or she may go and come by any means they desire. During the good weather many will doubtless walk as the distance is only about 1 1/4 miles.

The school board has arranged the plan with the Interurban company in order to assure parents convenient and inexpensive means of conveyance if they desire to employ it, and that only until the street car service is extended to the East Side.

This service, Mr. Gagnon hopes to have in operation some time this present month. In the meantime the Interurban company assures us of safe and comfortable cars with responsible drivers. A teacher or the principal at each building will be charged with the duty to see the children loaded and discharged morning and afternoon.

It is hoped that this measure may afford temporary relief until the building shortage can be solved in some more satisfactory manner.

PRUNE PACKING CO. LOSES \$20,000 SUIT

LAKEPORT, October 5.—The case of Milos M. Gopevic against the California Packing Corporation, covering \$20,000 damages for alleged failure of the packing company to accept the balance of Gopevic's prune crop for the year 1920, when the prunes were tendered for the delivery, was found in favor of the plaintiff.

The contract was made in June, 1920. During November, 1920, the packing company took about half of the crop and paid for it, but rejected the remaining fifty-four tons. About January 13, Gopevic, after weighing and sacking, tendered the balance of the crop to the corporation, who claimed the prunes were not sound and merchantable as stipulated in the contract and refused to accept the prunes.

The most interesting contention arose when attorneys for Gopevic demanded that the jury be permitted to inspect the prunes in the dry house. Judge Sayre reserved his decision on this point until all testimony was submitted, when after asking the jurors if they wished to see the prunes, to aid in reaching a verdict and over the objections of defendant's attorneys, nine jurors favored the tour of inspection which the judge then granted.

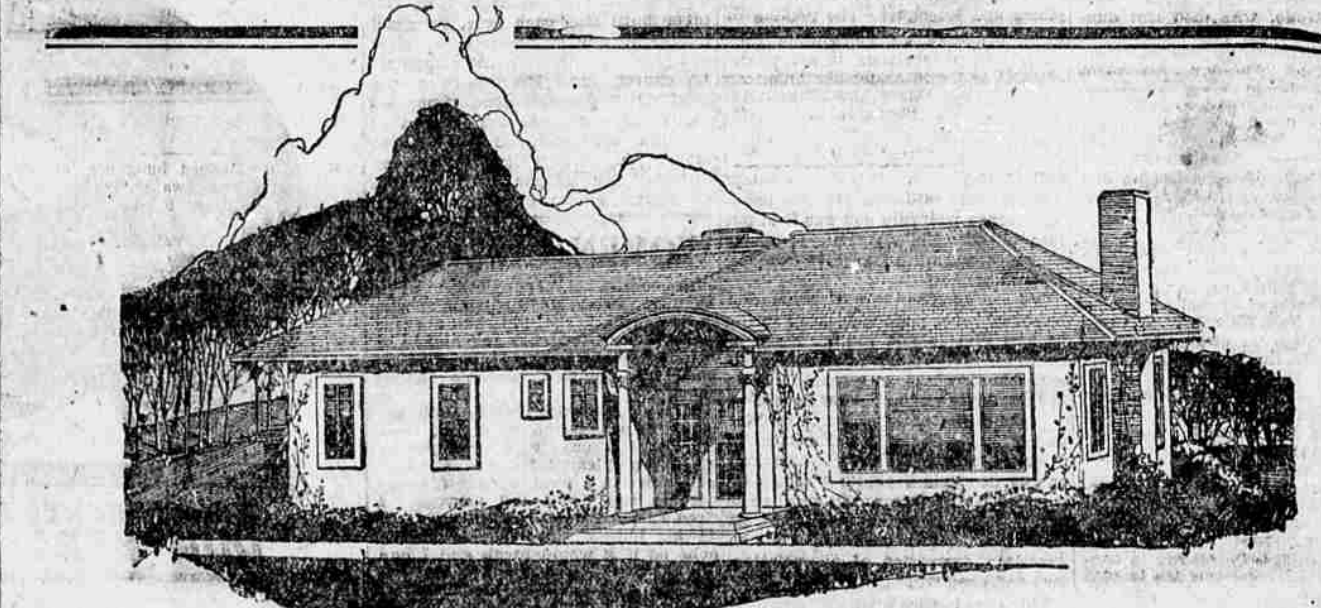
