

DRESSLER CHILD NOT INJURED BY CAR IS REPORT

Mrs. Eric Wold phoned this morning that she was the woman driver of the auto alleged to have struck Emil Dressler, a six year old girl on East Main street near the Roosevelt school Wednesday noon, and emphatically declares that she did not strike the girl. Mrs. Wold says that she was driving down from the Sacred Heart hospital, and Emil suddenly darted across the street in front of her car, but was in no danger. Mrs. Wold says she returned and lectured all the children on the danger of running in front of autos, and made them promise they would not do it any more.

"You are bad little girls if you run in front of cars," Mrs. Wold says she said.

The inference that she was "bad," angered Emil, who went home in a high huff.

Mrs. Wold says she knew nothing of the child's story till she read it in the Mail Tribune last evening. She declares that if the child has any bruises it was from other causes than being hit by an auto.

Mrs. F. H. Dressler, over the telephone this morning reiterated that her daughter had been hit by the auto, and thus the bruise to show for it.

OCTOBER TERM COURT TO OPEN OCTOBER 24TH

The petit jury for the October term of the circuit court will be called Monday, October 24 and the grand jury will be convened a week earlier, October 17th.

Among the cases to be considered by the grand jury are those of Rolfe Matthews charged with manslaughter as a result of the shooting of "Wig" Jacks at Eagle Point, and the bomb-throwing allegations growing out of the series of raids conducted in this city last August.

All these cases, if true bills are returned, will come before the petit jury, also the trial of four Bank of Jacksonville failure cases, that of Myrtle Blakeley, former county treasurer, Charles Owen, former orchardist now of Salt Lake City, U. D. Hines, ex-assistant cashier of the defunct bank, and Chester C. Kubli, Applegate rancher.

The court sessions are expected to last a month, and there is a long calendar of civil cases.
