GREECE PROTESTS L. OF N. BLOCKADE RULES TOO RIGID

GENEVA, Oct. 6.—(By Associated Press.) Eight states, members of the League of Nations, resumed in this morning's session of the assembly of the league, their fight against the too rigid application of blockade regulations, which are prescribed as one of the weapons to be used by the league against a state which has violated the covenant of the organization.
Greece has been especially active in her effort to bring about an amendment of article 16 of the covenant of the league, so that no state can initiate a blockade on its own account without previous notification from the council of the league that the blockade of a covenant breaker is in order.
A Greek amendment to article 16, which would provide that individual states would not exercise the right of blockade until a date had been fixed by the council was lost.
Several amendments proposed by the committee were adopted without modification. The principal changes made were in the provision for an adjournment of a blockade by particular states, which in the judgment of the council, run too great a risk from a neighbor which has violated the covenant. An additional clause stipulated the council would give an opinion where a breach of the covenant had taken place.
The constitutional committee upon advice from the council, has decided to drop the question of increasing the members of the council. The permanent mandates commission convened this morning for the first time. This commission, charged with the task of examining reports from mandatory nations on the administration of former German colonies and former Turkish territories has been promised early reports by France and Great Britain, although the mandates of the "A" and "B" classes have not as yet been approved.

BILLIONS LOST TO NATION BY HOST OF JOBLESS MEN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Losses in earnings of workers throughout the country during the past fiscal year, due to involuntary idleness were put at more than \$6,500,000,000, in an estimate prepared today by economic experts of the national conference on unemployment.
This estimate, it was explained, covered the loss in wages because of the unemployment of the jobless in the country from July, 1920 to August 15, 1921, and was based on approximation of normal pay levels rather than on the scales at the peak of high wages. Efforts of the conference, it was said, would be turned toward a remedy for the economic loss to the country from such reductions of the earning power of its workers in the future by a more stabilized industrial plan.
President Harding, in a statement made public yesterday, called upon governors and mayors throughout the country, to organize in their communities machinery for the correction of economic conditions along the lines already developed by the conference.

USE HORSE SENSE IN IRISH PEACE, PREMIER'S PLEA

INVERNESS, Scotland, Oct. 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Prime Minister Lloyd George speaking here concerning unemployment today touched on the Irish question, declaring the London conference beginning October 11 between representatives of the British government and the Sinn Fein "can only succeed if those who enter it make up their minds definitely and resolutely to trust to the common sense of their own people and do not try to reconcile the extremists."
INVERNESS, Scotland, Oct. 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—The prime minister, Mr. Lloyd George, in a speech here, today concerning unemployment, deviated in his introduction to refer optimistically to the forthcoming conference in Washington on limitation of armaments, deploring outstanding events which will affect human history for centuries.

PUBLIC OPINION TO SETTLE PROBLEMS

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 6.—Public opinion and its influence upon financial and economic problems today occupied the attention of the delegates to the convention of the American Bankers association. Both at the general and at the sectional sessions, speeches and reports were largely on that theme.
At the general session, the principal addresses were by Alexander Dana Noyes, financial editor of the New York Times, who spoke on "re-adjustment after war—past and present"; Dr. Henry T. Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington, whose subject was "economic intelligence in public opinion," and William Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific company who discussed how "public opinion can restore railroad credit and public prosperity."

DUFFY LEWIS LEADS COAST HITTERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—"Duffy" Lewis, Salt Lake, won the 1921 batting championship of the Pacific Coast league with a percentage of .401, according to unofficial averages made public here today.
"Hack" Miller, Oakland, was second with .347 and "Paddy" Siglin, Salt Lake, was third with .346. The next seven were Knight, Oakland, .343; Hale, Portland, .343; Kenworthy, Seattle, .339; Wilhoit, Salt Lake, .338; Bates, Seattle, .338; O'Doul, San Francisco, .336; and Pinelli, Oakland, .335.
O'Doul had the highest pitching average, .735, among the regular hurlers. Reihhart, Los Angeles, was second with .714, and Dell, Vernon, third with .667.

CHIEF COUNSEL FOR ARBUCKLE QUILTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Frank E. Dominguez, a Los Angeles attorney has withdrawn as chief counsel for Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe, Milton T. Cohen of Los Angeles, an associate counsel for Arbuckle, announced here today.

FARMER SUES U. P. FOR CAR SHORTAGE

TOPEKA, Kas., Oct. 4.—T. J. O'Brien a farmer of Plainville, Kas., today brought suit in the United States district court against the Union Pacific Railroad company for \$7269 damages. O'Brien claims he lost that amount on his wheat crop when the railroad company failed to supply him with grain cars.

BANKERS PREPARE PLAN FOR CRIME WAVE THIS WINTER

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 6.—A comprehensive advertising campaign dealing with the fundamentals of banking and emphasizing the mutual dependence of the banks and labor and industry, to be carried on in 1922, was advocated for the American Bankers association in a report submitted to its convention here yesterday by Francis H. Sisson, chairman of the public relations committee.
"We believe it is indeed time for the American Bankers association to inaugurate such a campaign," he said. "We speak with the utmost conviction in urging your support and co-operation for it, as well as for the regular publicity campaign for next year. It is far from altruistic to urge this. Rather it is the part of self-interest—intelligent self-interest. In the last analysis a true proclamation of the banks and their practices is most desirable from every point of view."
Measures to cope with a crime wave throughout the United States, predicted for the coming winter by the protective committee of the American Bankers association, were considered in the report filed with the convention by the manager of the protective department, and W. G. Fitzwilson, secretary of the protective committee. The report showed Oklahoma to lead the country for the last year in the number of bank holdups, fifteen such crimes having been committed in that state.

VOLUNTEERS ASKED FOR NAVAL RESERVE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Secretary Denby today issued a call for volunteers in the naval reserve force, reduced from 200,000 to barely 5000 by his recent order disenrolling all members of four reserve classes not on active duty. Mr. Denby, in a letter sent to each reservist, explained that the department's action was made necessary by lack of appropriations and pointed out the opportunity of joining the sixth class—the volunteer reserve—which serves without pay in peace time.

NOTED BLACK HILL FIGURE IS DEAD

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 6.—Major Michael McGuire, 76, resident of Rapid City, S. D., for many years, died at his home of his daughter here recently. He was well known in the Black Hills region, having gone there during the gold rush. He first engaged in staging and freighting, but later becoming the owner of mines at Pactola, S. D.
