GIANTS SMOTHER THE YANKS 13 TO 5

3 AMERICAN HURLERS ARE KNOCKED OUT

Giants Emerge From Batting Slump With Vengeance in Third Game, Winning in Frightful Bat Fest—Ruth Whangs Single, But Fails to Stem Defeat.

POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Giants emerged from their batting slump today, cuffed three Yankee hurlers off the mound and submerged the American league champions by a score of 13 to 5, in the third game of the world's series.

INDIAN YOUTH ACQUITTED ON CATTLE CHARGE

Fred Hood Found Not Guilty Stealing Red Cow, But Is Immediately Tried On Another Charge—Too Little Work, Says Father.

Fred Hood, a youth from the Klamath Indian reservation, charged with stealing a red cow, was found not guilty by a jury in the federal court Thursday afternoon.

A special venire was drawn for this case from local men, including Virgil Strang, J. L. Reed, Ed Binns, W. A. Gates and W. H. McDoland.

The principal witness for the defense in the acquittal was the defendant's father, Charles Hood, Sr., an educated Indian, licensed to plead before the Department of Interior.

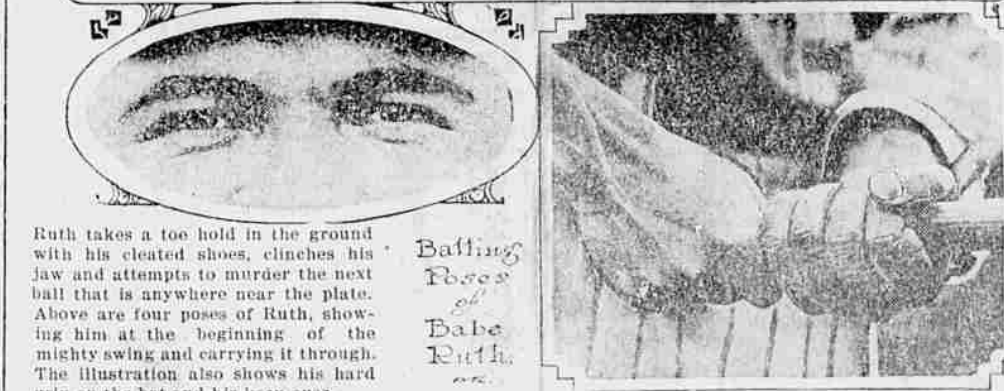
Hood in his own behalf testified that he had sold the red cow to Utter and Casteel, Fort Klamath butchers, for \$50, and that his brand was on it, and that he had found it grazing on the banks of Wood river.

Among the jurors called in the trial this morning of Hood and his cousin was W. A. Gates, a groceryman. Mr. Gates asked if he had encountered any experience with the aborigines, responded in the affirmative.

Thursday afternoon, Ed Justin, a rancher of Plugh, Oregon, was fined \$150 on conviction of a charge of being in illegal possession of a still. The evidence was circumstantial.

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EXPECT BRUMFIELD JURY BOX TO BE FILLED THIS P. M.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 7.—After the jury box had been filled with tentative jurors today for the trial of Dr. R. M. Brumfield for the alleged killing of Dennis Russell, six were removed by peremptory challenges, two by the state and four by the defense.

Dr. Brumfield complained of feeling sick when he left the court room at noon. "I couldn't eat any breakfast and I suffered a good deal during the night," he told newspaper men.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 7.—The second panel of veniremen summoned to obtain a jury to try Dr. R. M. Brumfield for the alleged murder of Dennis Russell was in attendance when court opened today.

Three of the new panel of fifty names were of men who are dead, one was paralyzed and some were out of the court's jurisdiction, to the sheriff's report.

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Agreement Signed By France to Save Germany From Ruin

PARIS, Oct. 7.—France is insured reparations payments and Germany in given a means to avoid possible bankruptcy through the agreement signed yesterday at Wiesbaden by Louis Loucheur, French minister of liberated regions, and Dr. Walter Rathenau, German minister of reconstruction.

The agreement is regarded here as of extreme importance and will permit Germany to pay the equivalent of seven billion gold marks in the next five years.

It is expressly stipulated that all deliveries shall be devoted to the re-construction of devastated regions in northern France, says an annex to the agreement.

ARBUCKLE IS ARRESTED ON BOOZE CHARGE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.—Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle, motion picture comedian, was arrested here today on a charge of violating the Volstead prohibition enforcement act in that he "had unlawfully possessed a quantity of intoxicating liquor."

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FINE STRIKE AT TRIGONIA CAUSES STIR

Crude Oil in Large Quantities Brought Up By Bailer Yesterday Causes Excitement Throughout Valley—Indications Strong That Paying Well Is Near.

The report in circulation in the city late last night and this forenoon that the Trigonia company had struck oil in paying quantity is not true, and arose from the fact that there is a splendid showing to indicate that oil may be struck in commercial quantity.

The work of actual drilling was stopped last July with the drill at a depth of 1350 feet, with the drill in a black lime shale in a strong showing of oil.

The fact that of the 1350 foot depth, there is a weight of 1100 feet of water resting on the bottom of the hole and there is such a tremendous pressure underneath sufficient to force the oil through the bottom and the 50 feet of tailings make the outlook for striking oil the best in the history of the well.

SCHOOL GIRL IS VICTIM OF HUMAN BEAST

MADISON, N. J., Oct. 7.—Pierced by 25 knife wounds, apparently the work of a maniac, the body of Janet Lawrence, 12-year-old school girl was found today concealed behind a log in Kluxen woods, near here.

The child was reported missing yesterday when she failed to return from the home of a neighbor, Mrs. Joseph Sandt, where she had been caring for the Sandt children.

A peculiar knot in twine, said by the police to be used only in greenhouses to bind rosebushes, is one of the clues to the murderer. The child's hands were tied behind her with this twine.

ALLOT 10 MILLION SPOKANE FARMERS

SPOKANE, Oct. 7.—Ten million dollars has been allotted to the local office of the war finance corporation for loans to farmers and livestock raisers of Washington and northern Idaho, it was announced today by R. L. Rutter, chairman of the Washington general loan agency of the corporation.

This sum is aside from a like amount authorized for the Northwest Wheat Growers, associated, and is available to farmers who are not members of the wheat growers organization.

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
