### GIANT MUSHROOMS FOUND IN FRANCE

PARIS.—Two mammoth mushrooms enough to "smother" all the steaks available in a kind quarter of beef, have just been found in France. Four feet in diameter and weighing between nine and ten pounds the first one was found on an estate in Saint Germain. The species is edible and is known popularly in the district as the "death's head" mushroom. The other known as the "beaded puff-ball" has been picked at Bourgneuf. It weighs close to nine pounds and has a "flap" diameter of nearly 20 inches.

### ANGLER IS ARRESTED AS COUNTERFEITER

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 13.—Dante DeStephano, a fisherman, was arrested by secret service operatives yesterday on a charge of counterfeiting after they had obtained alleged evidence that he had turned out spurious fifty-cent pieces in this city and Seattle. The counterfeit was said by the secret service agents to be an exceptionally good one. According to the government agents DeStephano told them that he passed many of the counterfeit coins for counterfeit whiskey and that he had a plant outside of Sacramento for the manufacture of such coins.

### DR. SUN YAT SEN TO LEAD NEW ATTACK

MANILA, Oct. 13.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, head of the Chinese government established at Canton, will leave Canton, October 15 at the head of a south China expeditionary force of six divisions, according to a cablegram received here by Jue Geowen, chief of the South China aviation bureau, who is in Manila. The cablegram also said that Sun Yat Sen's wife would accompany her husband into the field at the head of a Red Cross organization.

Canton advices received in New York yesterday said that Dr. Sun Yat Sen and his troops would join the army in Kwangsi for a drive against Peking.

### SEATTLE VISITED BY A WAITER'S STRIKE

SEATTLE, Oct. 13.—Nine large Seattle restaurants were affected today by a strike of union employes to resist wage cuts ranging from fifty cents to \$2 a day proposed by the Seattle Caterers' association, according to union officials. Restaurant proprietors declared that little or no difficulty had been encountered in securing full non-union crews.

Union officials indicated that cooks and waiters employed in other restaurants would walk out today if the proposal for wage decreases were not withdrawn.

According to Paul J. Jenseff, secretary of the Seattle Caterers' association, the proposed cuts would restore wages to the level in effect last May 1, when increases were granted.

### FIND WOMAN GUILTY FORGING T. R.'S NAME

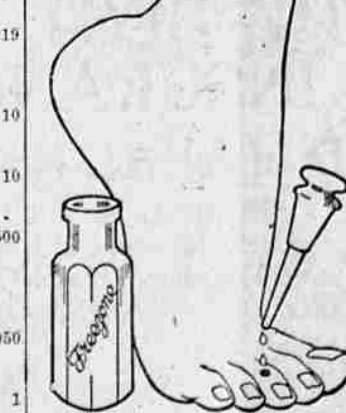
