MERCHANTS FORM OWN BUREAU IN C. OF COMMERCE

It has been a long cherished hope of the directors of the chamber that the retailers would get together for the purpose of solving the problems, which directly affect them and a committee was appointed to work out a plan which would be agreeable to the majority of the retailers of this city.

The closing of stores for certain events is a question for the retailers themselves to decide. Freight rates, the parking of cars, window trimming, lighting effects and modern methods of merchandising are some of the questions that will come up for discussion at the dinner meetings, of which there are eight, the first of which will be held at the Legion hall next Monday, October 17 at 6:30 p. m.

53 BABIES REGISTER AT MEDFORD CLINIC

The Baby Clinic which was held yesterday afternoon at the Y. W. C. A. headquarters on N. Bartlett street, under the auspices of the Jackson county Nurses association in conjunction with the Red Cross was a decided success. Fifty-three babies were registered. The clinic was conducted by Miss Faldine, the county nurse, who was assisted by Miss Van Scoyoc, school nurse for the cities of Medford and Ashland and by Miss Poole, county demonstrator, who addressed the mothers on baby feeding. Drs. Hayes, Holt, Clancy, Conroy, Heine, Murphy, Kauffman and Phipps donated their services in examination of the infants.

These clinics will be conducted at intervals in the future and will be supplemented by a monthly weighing and measuring meeting which will be held for the purpose of keeping a check on the progress of the children.

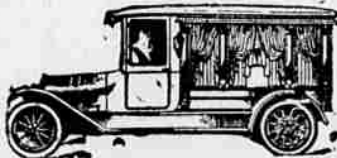
