### JUSTICE BENSON'S FUNERAL HELD IN SALEM TODAY

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 18.—Flags on the capitol and supreme court buildings and all state institutions are flying at half mast today out of respect to the memory of Justice Henry L. Benson of the Oregon supreme court, who died at his home here Saturday night. Cases set for hearing before the supreme court have been postponed and no opinions—ordinarily handed down on Tuesday morning—will be forthcoming until after the funeral of Justice Benson this afternoon. Many state departments will close during the funeral hour.

The co-workers of the late jurist on the supreme bench, Chief Justice Burnett and Associate Justices Bean, Brown, Harris, McBride and McCourt, will act as pallbearers. This, it is noted, will be the third time within very recent years that the six surviving members of the court have officiated at the funeral of the seventh member, the other two cases being at the funeral of Justice Robert Eakin and Justice F. A. Moore.

Chief Justice Burnett in commenting upon the death of his colleague this morning summed up his sentiments in this terse statement: "He was a genial gentleman, a sound lawyer and a just judge."

Governor Oloot in a statement to the press declares that in the death of Justice Benson "Oregon has lost not only one of its able and conscientious jurists but it has lost a citizen in the highest meaning of the word."

While the governor refuses to comment on a possible successor to Justice Benson until after the funeral it has been intimated that the post will go to an eastern Oregon man. Should this be the case rumor has it that Judge J. W. Knowles, La Grande, circuit judge for Union and Wallowa counties, will be appointed. The name of Judge John S. Coke of Marshfield, twice a candidate for the post, is also prominently mentioned in connection with the forthcoming appointment.
