WANT YELLOW LABOR IN HAWAIIAN ISLANDS DECLARES SUGAR MAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—Congress and the people of the United States are coming to realize that a distinction must be drawn between labor and immigration conditions in the continental United States and in its tropical territory of Hawaii, according to a statement issued today by Charles Chillingworth, president of the senate of the Territory of Hawaii, and Albert Horner, territorial sugar expert.

Chillingworth and Horner sailed today for Honolulu after spending four months at Washington endeavoring to impress on the administration and congress their views of the necessity of permitting the importation of foreign labor to Hawaii.

In their statement issued today they said: "Immediate action by congress on the Hawaiian emergency labor resolution is impossible on account of the press of other important measures. Hawaii never has been considered in the past in the enactment of immigration laws and despite its isolated and tropical nature it has been forced to struggle for existence under laws designed to meet mainland conditions."

SPORTSMEN'S MEETING HERE IS POSTPONED

The big meeting of the Southern Oregon Sportsmen's Game and Protective association, which was scheduled to be held in the public library here on October 24, has been postponed until after November 1. At this gathering Colonel George Kelly of the state game commission, and Captain A. E. Burghoff, the state fish and game warden, will be guests of honor.

Plans will be discussed and formulated at the meeting for fish and game laws to cover this section, and the proposed enlargement of Crater Lake national park by including Diamond lake and vicinity within its confines will also be discussed.
