

MILLER TO STAY OVER TO SEE THYE-OLSEN GO

World's Champion Anxious to See Medford Match Tomorrow Night—Winner Scheduled to Meet Miller in City at Later Date.

The Thye-Olsen wrestling match is going to be so good that Walter Miller, world's middleweight champion wrestler, has decided to stay over in Medford for the sole purpose of seeing it.

Mr. Olson has been training steadily and is in the finest condition of his career. Olson, who has been in the wrestling game since he was 16 years old, broke in the game at Duluth, Minn., at the age of 15 years, and was a trial horse for near champions until he won the amateur championship of the United States in

1911 during the Olympic tryouts. In 1912 he represented the United States in the 135 pound class, winning the world's amateur championship from the champions of 12 different countries.

Ted Thye is a finished wrestler and can give anybody in the game a run for their money, bar none.

These two are evenly matched and the winner will meet Walter Miller in Medford for the world's championship if this match is a financial success.

Medford at present is the wrestling center of the entire country, there being no less than 10 near champions

here, with more on the road to challenge the winner.

George V. Adams and the boxing commission have ordered a new 20 foot ring and mat for this match, which will be large enough that the ropes will not be so handy.

Wrestlers in town now are Walter Miller, Thor Olson, Prof. Kanthe, Oklahoma Bearcat, Ralph Sawd, Ed Olin, Tacoma, Ed Olson with Mike Yokel and Nick Carter on the way.

At the Gold Hill match Wednesday night there was a large number of ladies present and witnessed a clean athletic contest with no rowdyism and there will be no rowdyism at the match Friday night.

2 COMMITTEES PLAN ATTACK U. S. OFFICIALS IF DAGOES DIE

At Meeting Last Night First Definite Step Is Taken Toward Establishing Country Club—Committees to Report at Future Meeting.

The first step toward the establishment of a golf club in Medford was taken at the public library last night when on motion of Attorney O. C. Boggs, Mayor Gates as chairman appointed the following committees to thoroughly investigate the situation and report at a subsequent meeting:

Finance and organization: T. E. Daniels, chairman, Col. Gordon Voorhies, George Collins, Wm. G. Tait, and Vernon Vawter.
Location and grounds: H. Chandler Egan, chairman, R. H. McCurdy, Delroy Getchell, Dr. J. J. Emmens and Ralph Cowgill.

These committees will start work at once and it is expected their report will be ready within a week or ten days, perhaps before.

Over fifty people attended the meeting, both men and women, and after Mayor Gates outlined the benefits of such a club, particularly as an asset to the city in the way of attracting tourists and future residents from the east and middle west, he asked for an expression of opinion from the audience, and approval of a country club was unanimous.

Many spoke in favor of the project and H. Chandler Egan outlined the prospective cost, and answered a number of questions. Mr. Egan laid particular stress upon the desirability of putting in a good course, maintaining that a poor course would be worse than nothing as it would send the visiting golfer away, disgusted, a knocker of the place rather than a booster.

railway employes division of the American Federation of Labor in a memorial forwarded to them today by the National Grange and the National Milk Producers federation.

before the American Mining congress. "Because of the rapid growth in the mining industry and the position of increasing importance that it has and will continue to assume for the nation as a whole, there should be no question but that it is entitled to cabinet representation," Senator Nicholson said.

PARIS, Oct. 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Retaliatory measures in the event of the execution of the two Italians, Sacco and Vanzetti, convicted of murder in Massachusetts, are threatened against the American consulates in Paris, Bordeaux, Lyons and Marseilles, in letters received at those consulates today signed by communist organizations.

Similar threats were made against the offices of the American reparations commission and the American passport bureau in Paris in letters sent to those offices.

Strong police guards were placed around the American consulate and the reparations and passport bureau offices here this evening.

Alexander M. Thackara, the American consul general, received a letter tonight from a communist organization in a small town near Lille, declaring that Americans in France would be the object of retaliatory measures if the executions took place.

The passport and reparations bureaus occupy a new building near the Place de l'Étoile. Threats are made in the letters to blow up the buildings in the event of the execution.

It now is believed by the authorities that there is a general plot against all American officials in France.

Forty-six additional letters of protest in connection with the convicted men were received by Ambassador Herrick this afternoon.

her husband, ignorant that the jury had rendered its judgment. She smiled at him and he smiled back. Then she whispered to him. Brumfield's reply was inaudible. Mrs. Brumfield turned pale and she bit her lip in an effort to hold herself together. The judge then said sentence would be passed Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

"I Won't Run Away"
Tears came to Mrs. Brumfield's eyes, and an instant later when someone tapped the doctor on the shoulder to take him back to jail, she broke down. Her head dropped on her husband's shoulder and she wept.

Later, they took her into the judge's chambers until she had recovered sufficiently to walk, in company with Miss Ellenburg, from the court room.

"So this is the verdict!" said Brumfield as they led him back to his prison. "Tiny Bill" Kepper, his jailer took him by the arm. "You don't need to hold me," the convicted delinquent said. "I'm not going to run away."

The other prisoners in the jail had waited up for him.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 20.—Sentence of death by hanging is to be imposed Saturday morning upon Dr. R. M. Brumfield, according to announcement in court after a verdict was returned at midnight by the jury, which for days had been hearing the story of the wrecked automobile and the headless body of Dennis Russell.

The prisoner, who throughout the two weeks of trial maintained a stolid exterior, showed no emotion when the verdict was read and walked with firm step to the jail.

Mrs. Brumfield was still in a state of collapse this morning following her breakdown in court when the finding of the jurors was announced.

Brumfield's sole interest when he was awakened about eight o'clock this morning was when he might see his wife. He declared that he had slept well, except for a sore throat.

"Doctor," he was asked, "were you surprised at the verdict?"
"Well, I will tell you," he answered. "I am just as innocent of that as anybody could be, but I was not surprised at the verdict because I wasn't able to help my lawyers and the evidence was as damning as could be."
"But just as sure as there is a God in heaven I am innocent."
"If I thought for one minute that I was responsible for that man's death I would have said so."
"I know the story I told sounded awfully wild, but it was the facts, the only thing I know."

Nearly 100 witnesses testified at the trial, the state having 60.

Final decision regarding the communist manifestation announced for tomorrow evening remains to be taken.

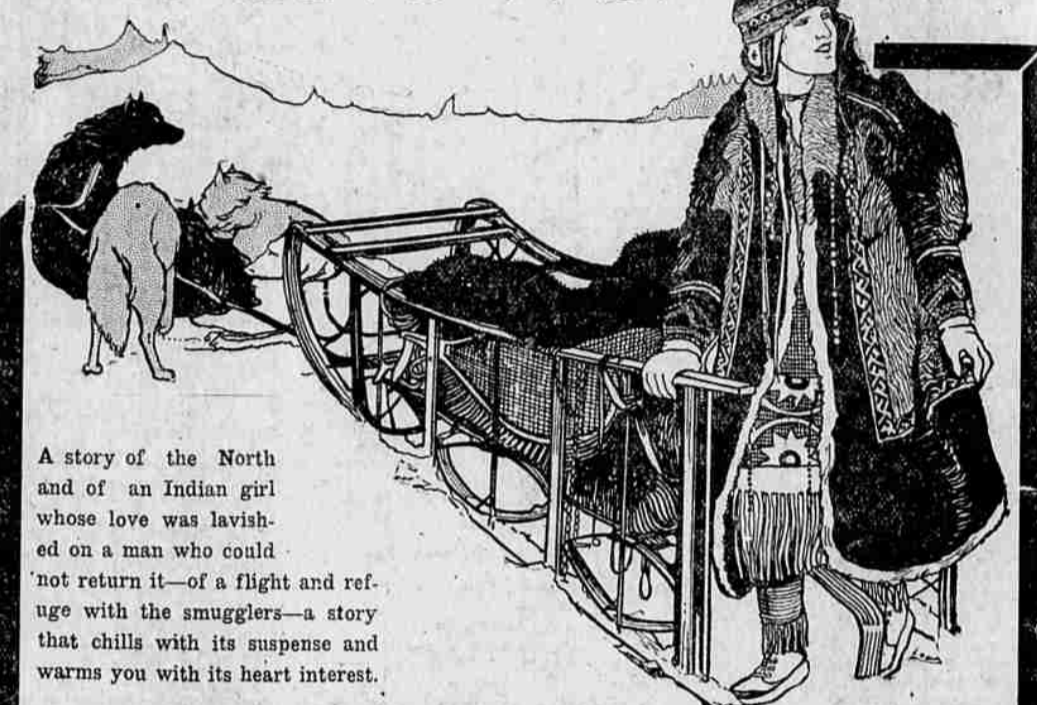
