The Oregon state highway department stands ready to match, within 90 days, all federal money made available for use on post roads in this state, according to a telegram sent by Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer, to Herbert Hoover, chairman of the federal unemployment conference, this morning. Hoover had wired the highway department for advice as to how far Oregon could go toward relieving the unemployment situation should the federal aid bill pass congress within 10 days. The bill before congress carries with it an annual appropriation of \$75,000,000 for post roads, of which Oregon hopes to receive at least \$1,500,000, to be matched dollar for dollar with state funds.
