### FIRE OF UNKNOWN ORIGIN DAMAGES F. DIAMOND HOME

The family left the house about 7 o'clock to visit the carnival and upon their return home at 10 p. m. discovered the dwelling on fire in the interior in the combination living and dining room. The fire department was quickly summoned and in the meantime the family and neighbors did their best to attempt to quell the flames. The firemen quickly finished the job.

The walls, ceiling and flooring were badly burned and the fire entered a wardrobe destroying all of Mrs. Diamond's wearing apparel except what she had on, and half of Mr. Diamond's clothing outfit. Much of the furniture was badly burned and damaged, including a piano.

The loss on house and contents is covered by insurance. The Diamond family is temporarily living with neighbors until they obtain new quarters, as it will take some time to have the house repaired.

### INSANE MORO KILLS FAMILY OF ELEVEN

MANILA, Oct. 19.—A Moro named Andangan, becoming suddenly insane at Catabato, island of Mindanao, ran amok, killed eleven members of his family with a bolo and then committed suicide, according to advices received here by Philippine Constabulary headquarters. Andangan's family, which he wiped out, consisted of eight daughters one son and two grandsons, their ages ranging from one to 25 years.

### BRITISH ADMIRAL IS GUEST OF LEGION

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Escorted by a squadron of American destroyers which picked the liner Aquitania up before dawn off Ambrose Light, Admiral Earl Beatty of the British navy arrived here today as the guest of the American Legion. The admiral will attend the legion convention in Kansas City.

The batteries of Forts Hamilton and Wadsworth thundered a salute of 19 guns as the liner bearing the commander of the grand fleet during the world war slipped past on her way to quarters.

Admiral and Lady Beatty were to be created at quarantine by American Legion and the state and municipal government and taken off in the navy cutter Vigilant.

After the legation convention Admiral Beatty will go to Washington, where he is to serve in an advisory capacity to the British delegation at the armament conference.

### FIGHTING AGGIES READY FOR GAME WITH WASHINGTON

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 21.—For the first time in the history of the Oregon Agricultural college the University of Washington will play the "Fighting Aggies" on the Aggie field at Corvallis.

Saturday afternoon at 2:45 two teams equally determined to win the coast conference will face each other. Last year the "Sun Dodgers" were defeated by the "Fighting Aggies" with a score of 3 to 9 on their own field. They are coming back to revenge the place-kick of Andy Crowell who sent the plunk over the cross bars for the only points made in the game.

The "Aggies" are working hard and with a determination to celebrate the event of Washington's first appearance with a victory for O. A. C. They have not yet had a real battle against an opposing team.

"Jimmy" Richardson general manager, predicts that between 8000 and 10,000 persons will come by automobile alone. The seating capacity will be approximately 14,000 and at the rate tickets are selling it is expected that a record breaking crowd will be here. The Corvallis stores will be closed—members of the commercial club being behind the team to the man.

### START U. S. TROOPS OFF RHINE EARLY DATE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The formal terms of ratification of the peace treaties with Germany and Austria have been sent forward to Berlin and Vienna, it was announced today. As soon as these formal exchanges have been completed with the former enemy powers it is expected that immediate steps will be taken to set up diplomatic machinery and resume full normal relations with those governments.

American troops will begin moving out of Germany immediately upon the exchange of the ratification of the German treaty, it was added. The movement, it was said, would be normal but slow and will begin in approximately two weeks.

a dispute between the carriers and their employes concerning wages, rules and working conditions "this board assumes jurisdiction of said dispute on the statutory ground that it is likely substantially to interrupt commerce."

Meanwhile both parties to the dispute are warned to maintain the status quo on the properties of the carriers. The action by the board followed a conference which began at ten o'clock. Board members declined to say whether they had been in touch with Washington by long distance telephone during the morning.

### Unions Refuse Peace

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—Lack of any provision by the unions for suspending the railroad strike called for October 29 made it impossible to accept the plan offered by the United States railroad labor board yesterday. It was said today in union circles. The board, it was said, presented three proposals to the presidents of the big four brotherhoods and the switchmen's union. They were:

1. The railroads to make a reduction in freight rates corresponding to the wage reduction of July 1, less such reductions as have already been made since that date.

2. The railroads to refrain from asking the United States railroad labor board for a further wage reduction until the last cut has been translated into rate reductions.

3. The unions to suspend or withdraw their strike order.

The five union presidents were willing to accept the first two, but declared they had made no arrangements for suspending their strike and any settlement must be made before October 29 or the walkout would automatically become effective.

The board, it was reported today, assured the union leaders that the railroads could not get a decision for months, even if they filed their proposed request for a ten per cent wage reduction immediately.

Brotherhood leaders, who had already declared the plan impossible, made no effort to conceal their disappointment that the board had nothing else to offer.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Chicago packers today began storing fresh meats for emergency use in event of a railroad strike. Preparations are being made, it was said, to stock strategic distributing centers to the maximum.

in connection with the Massachusetts case, two of them containing threats of reprisals against Americans if the executions took place. The guard at the embassy was increased today and every possible precaution has been taken to protect the passport bureau, the reparations commission offices and the American consulate.

The communist mass meeting of protest against the conviction of the two Italians, called for tonight in one of the largest halls of Paris, is causing some apprehension, and the republican guard has been called out to keep order and prevent demonstrations of any kind in front of the embassy or other American offices.
