COUNTY AD FUND BOOSTED, AGENTS FUND REDUCED

The county budget committee met Thursday at Jacksonville, and completed its sessions for the year, appropriating \$1500 for advertising county resources and the county as may be deemed advisable. \$500 of this may be used for the county exhibit at the state fair is so ordered. A delegation headed by Mayor Gates waited upon the budget committee in reference to the allowance. \$5500 was allowed for payment on an armory in this city.

The allowance for the expenses and salaries of fruit inspectors was cut from \$4000 to \$3900, and the allowance for the county pathologist's work clipped from \$6600 to \$4500, with the provision that if more money was needed it would be granted by the county court.

The salary and expenses of the stock inspector was boosted from \$250 to \$500. The salary of the watermaster was clipped from \$1800 to \$1500, and the treasurer's pay and expenses elevated from \$2450 to \$2880. The surveyor's office expense was reduced from \$1700 to \$1200. The cost of running Jackson county for the year was fixed at \$672,430, and the receipts estimated at \$52,250.

STRONG DEFENSE IS PRESENTED BY BIG PINES CO.

Good progress was made in the civil action in the federal court between the McComber-Savidge Lumber company and the Big Pines Lumber company for the recovery of approximately \$29,000 for alleged non-fulfillment of contract.

The principal witness and first one for the defense was Bert Theirolf, who told the jury that the Big Pines Lumber company had made every effort, consistent "with good sawmill practice" to meet the demands of the contract and that when all efforts to secure shipping orders from the plaintiff company for the lumber cut, they served notice an effort would be made to sell it on "the open market."

Theirolf underwent a long cross-examination at the hand of Attorney Webb but his straightforward story was unshaken. At one juncture, the court again called attention to the conflict in the clauses of the contract under dispute, bringing spirited arguments from both sides. Much of Theirolf's testimony was rebutted of that offered by Mr. McComber and Savidge.

A. L. Hill, president of the Big Pines company was a witness this morning, but was only on the stand for a short time.

Thomas E. Mordhoff, a grader for the Weed company was called as an expert witness by the defense, and testified to regrading the lumber in the Southern Oregon Lumber company yard, and said it was well manufactured. Other employees of the lumber company will be called to refute the allegation of the plaintiff that the timber was not cut according to specifications.

The case will probably go to the jury tomorrow morning.
