FARTHEST WEST.

IT SEEMS strange to Easterners that so much importance should be attached to the Pacific Ocean in the coming arms conference. Present difficulties in that direction are admitted to exist, but the majority of Easterners do not seem as yet to have taken them very seriously. The Japanese problem is acute they say only on the Pacific coast. Asiatic affairs in general make little appeal in this country.

The majority of Europeans are still less concerned. They are occupied with their own problems and those of their immediate neighbors.

The farthest-sighted statesmen, however, both in Washington and in Europe, recognize the inevitable trend, and foresee trouble in the Pacific if measures are not taken in time to avoid it. Left to develop without intelligent control, the Pacific may well become the center of a world embroilment. Asiatic disturbances and provocations might drag America into war, and thence the rest of the world.

It is a danger caused by the inevitable tendency of events. "Westward the course of empire takes its way." It has now covered this vast continent, and is still following the sun. "Farthest west" is already beyond our Pacific coast.

Sooner or later, what we know as the Far East will have become the West. Is that to become a West for white people, or for yellow people? Or for both? Are both races to mix, or to strive for mastery all around the edges of the great bowl of the Pacific?

The time to think about that is now, when it may still be possible to map out a plan of development acceptable to America, Asia and Europe.

Weekly Report on Pacific Highway

To the Editor: The condition of the Pacific Highway between Roseburg and the California line, as of this date, is as follows:

Roseburg-Myrtle Creek: 20 miles. Paved.

Myrtle Creek-Canyonville: 19 miles. The bridge across the Umpqua River is completed so that traffic can now use the main highway.

Macadam is completed from Myrtle Creek to the Umpqua River, a distance of six miles and the remaining three miles to Canyonville is being macadamized; the road over this section is fair.

Canyonville-Galesville: 11 miles. Good macadam.

Galesville-Wolf Creek: 14 miles. Paving in progress from both ends, 11 miles being already completed.

About seven miles south of Galesville between the hours of 7:30 a. m. and 3:30 p. m., south-bound traffic is detoured over the old road via Glendale to Stage Road Pass. The Tunnel Road to Wolf Creek is no longer used. This detour is in good condition to Glendale and from there to Stage Road Pass, the road has been lately graveled by the County Court. All north-bound traffic will use main highway at all hours. Short delays may be necessary between Stage Road Pass and Cow Creek where construction is in progress.
