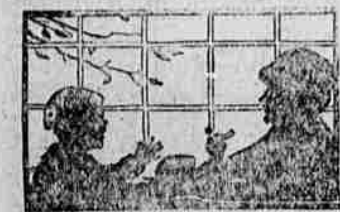

President Harding Starts 1st Speaking Trip Thru the South

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—President Harding left Washington this morning on a special train for a four day trip through the south, his first visit to that section since his inauguration.

Three addresses are to be made by the president during the trip, two at Birmingham, Ala., and one at Atlanta. A stop will be made at Camp Benning, Ga., for inspection of the infantry school there.

The president was accompanied by Mrs. Harding, Secretaries Weeks and Fall, Senator and Mrs. Underwood of Alabama, George B. Christian, Jr., secretary to the president and Brigadier General Sawyer, the president's physician.

SOUTHERLY GALES IS PREDICTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—Strong southerly to southwesterly gales were predicted for the Pacific coast today and tomorrow, north of Cape Blanco by the United States weather bureau here and storm warnings were ordered hoisted at all Washington and Oregon stations. The bureau's warning said that the storm is moving southeast from the north Pacific.

the position of district engineer, but suggested that he take charge at the Fish Lake dam. This arrangement was not agreeable to Cupper, so Mr. Cole of Portland was recommended. Cole replied he could not take charge before November 1, which rendered him unavailable. Then Ralph Cowbill was recommended and was placed in charge.

"We acted with every possible dispatch," said Mr. Perry today, "and feel that Mr. Henney's resignation was not justified as far as any action on our part was concerned. However as he has resigned several times before, we have decided to accept it this time and believe with the work so nearly completed we can get along without anyone to take his place. However, if at any time we feel in need of expert advice other than what can be secured from the state engineer, we shall not hesitate to secure it at once."

CRISIS OVER IN IRISH TURMOIL KING MAY ACT

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(By Associated Press.) An official communique issued after the Sinn Fein representatives had left the British premier's official residence this evening said "the meeting of the full conference on Ireland was postponed as a committee from the conference was sitting."

The conference re-assembled at 4:30 o'clock.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(By Associated Press.) The view was expressed at Sinn Fein headquarters this forenoon that the crisis in the Irish conference was over for the present.

The Daily Eireann representatives who said last night that if the negotiations were broken off today they would return to Ireland tonight, were this morning making no preparations to leave.

There was a rumor current this morning that King George might, if necessary use any influence he possessed within the limits of the British constitution to harmonize the conflicting viewpoints in the conference. There was no outward sign that such intervention would take place and it was obvious the king's influence would have to be exerted with the greatest caution, if at all.

ing the railroad labor board has cited all general chairmen of the "big five" railroad transportation organizations to appear before the board tomorrow, Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, today said he had notified the general chairmen of his organization they need not respond to the citation.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 25.—Notice was sent from the national headquarters here today of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees, numbering more than 200,000, members, that the organization is not in sympathy with the proposed railway strike and members are ordered not to obey the order to cease work.

PALESTINE, Texas, Oct. 25.—The strike on the International and Great Northern railroad of some 600 brakemen and switchmen, members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, entered its fourth day quietly with company officials expressing the belief that freight service would be further extended today.

Strike leaders declared, however, that the tie up was 100 per cent complete.

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—(By the Associated Press.) Judge R. M. Barton, chairman of the United States railroad labor board, today telegraphed the heads of the four brotherhoods and the switchmen's union reiterating previous announcements that all general chairmen are expected to attend the hearing starting here tomorrow.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 25.—Prior to their return to Chicago tonight, where, on Wednesday, they will appear before the United States railroad labor board in answer to citation, the "big five" railroad transportation chiefs were to continue their conference today on matters pertaining to the strike situation. Answers to all messages from general chairmen are agreed upon by the five leaders before they are dispatched, thus maintaining unity of action.

The "big five" leaders discount intimations that there is discord between the organizations that have authorized their members to withdraw from the service and those withholding such authorization. Both Presidents Warren S. Stone of the engineers and L. E. Sheppard of the conductors have openly stated they do not think there is "an open break." Mr. Stone flatly asserted there is none.

W. S. Carter, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen, telegraphed the board this morning saying: "My understanding is either party can be represented by counsel and that all railroad executives will not be present in person. Please wire me if my understanding is not correct." Mr. Barton's general message followed.

'KANSAS CITY STAR' WINS LIBEL SUIT

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 25.—A verdict in favor of the St. Louis Star was returned by a jury in circuit court here yesterday in a one hundred thousand dollar libel suit brought by Alexander P. MacAuley of Toronto, Ont.

The suit was based on news articles printed on MacAuley's arrest here in January of 1917. Suspected of passing forged checks, MacAuley later was exonerated.

In instructing the jury Judge Grimm stated a newspaper had a right to print official police reports.

MILLION DOLLAR HAUL BY N. Y. AUTO BANDITS

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Three automobile bandits who held up a United States mail truck in lower Broadway last night, escaping with four pouches or registered mail, were being sought by the police and postoffice inspectors today.

A postal inspector on the case was reported to have told city detectives the pouches contained about \$1,000,000 in money and negotiable paper. Other estimates fixed the value of the haul around \$100,000.
