SNOW DRIVES J. HEMSTREET FROM C. LAKE WILDS

Alex Sparrow, superintendent of Crater National park is all alone at government camp in that vast bleak region, with a foot or two of snow on the ground save for the presence of Jack Mabin, the caretaker at the lodge, a mile away. This news was brought back to the city late last night by Jack Hemstreet, who had been serving as one of Sparrow's foremen since the middle of summer, and who left with David Saively, one of the truck drivers and the last remaining laborer, for Medford Wednesday noon. Herman Brown, the park ranger, departed from government camp at the same time with all the work horses for Fort Klamath, except one team. "We left government camp with a foot and a half of snow on the ground, and in the midst of one of the hardest snow storms I ever saw," says Hemstreet. "We supposed all the time that Sparrow was going to come with us until at the last minute he decided to stay, saying 'It takes more than a little snow to drive me back to town.' Sparrow will probably stay until there is a snow depth of four or five feet or more, and then will make his way out on a sled drawn by the team of blacks left with him. It has been snowing more or less since last Saturday at the lake, but until yesterday morning the snow mostly passed away."

LEADER \$500,000 BOOZE RING IS ARRESTED S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—The arrest of W. J. Harrington, a cafe proprietor, by federal authorities today, is said by the authorities to have disclosed information that he is the head of an alleged liquor smuggling ring that has brought whiskey valued at more than \$500,000 into this state from British Columbia, and that he was secretly indicted recently for violation of the Volstead prohibition enforcement act. Following his arrest, Robert H. McCormack, assistant United States attorney general to prosecute Volstead act violations, said that the grand jury evidence against Harrington showed that he sided in directing the operations of a string of supposed whiskey runners who brought liquor from Vancouver, B. C., to Half Moon Bay, south of here, Monterey and San Luis Obispo.

Patrick Nevil, a garage man, who was indicted with Harrington, also was arrested today.

The north did come to you with olive branch instead of sword; and you went to the north and west and became full partners in making that new empire which together we carved out of the trans-Missouri wilderness; and now truly, there can be described no sectional division of this land.

Example to World "It has seemed to me many times in the period since the world war ended that the world at large might well let us show it the marvel which was wrought through a reunited and restored America.

"I believe that every family which has lost a member in the struggle to save mankind from absolutism; every soldier who has given years and sufferings to that cause; every gold star mother or maimed veteran, will agree that peace is preferable to war and that to train a world in the ways of peace is better than to prepare it for war. I would not have you misconstrue that it is wholly inconsistent to preach peace and yet make sure about our proper defense.

"Manifestly, mankind is disposed to try that experiment. If, trying it, nations shall fail, it will be no fault of the United States of America. Our own experience has taught us that we may hope that a like decision will be reached by a world reasoning amid the convictions which follow in the wake of a tragedy supreme."

FUR FLIES IN EDWARDS TRIAL

Saturday afternoon, August 6th before the trip to Crater Lake, and that she inquired of Edwards, "are you going to the dance at Prospect?" and was informed that the jaunt would be taken if a crowd could be gathered. She said she was introduced to Gates and that he asked her to go with him. "I told him 'yes,' as I did not care who I went with as long as I got there."

She also testified that Gates was "too drunk to walk or dance." James (Shine) Edwards took the stand in his own behalf at the opening of the defense in his trial on an indictment charging selling of intoxicating liquor.

Edwards told the jury that Gates told him he "was a creamery man, and wanted to visit every farm in the valley that had a milk cow." He said the plans for the Crater Lake joyride were arranged by Gates, and that the women in the party were Mrs. Frankie Edwards, a sister-in-law of the defendant and Billie Duley, a waitress. He said they left Medford and arrived at Prospect about midnight, that Gates took drinks along the road, and that he was sick. He said at Prospect, Gates fell down and insisted on going into the dancehall, and that while there Gates met George O. Roberts, and offered him a drink. About 3 o'clock in the morning they left Prospect and drove to Crater Lake, where they procured breakfast. Gates, he testified was sick and unable to eat dinner. He also said that enroute to Prospect the car struck a bump and the resultant impact threw Gates against the top of the car, bruising his forehead.

Edwards testified that the party returned to Medford that Sunday evening and that Gates paid him \$50 for the trip.

Denies Taking Drink The defendant testified that on a day or two previous to the Crater Lake trip Gates hired him for a drive, and that at Tenth and Oakdale they met one George Grigsby in a Ford, and that Grigsby told them to drive to the King Street garage, which they did, and there Gates received a package, which was alleged contained moonshine. Edwards denied that he ever took a drink, but went through the motions only. He also denied that he had ever been in Gates' room.

George O. Roberts testified that he saw Gates in Prospect on the night of August 6th and that he "was intoxicated."

A McLane, a Canadian war veteran wounded four times, and proprietor of the King Street garage corroborated the testimony of Edwards that Gates had received a package in his garage on the afternoon of August 6th, from a stranger.

John Goodwin, a taxi driver of Edwards, testified that he heard a conversation between Edwards and Sandifer, in front of the Justice court in Medford in which Sandifer told them "if you fellows plead guilty I believe you will get off with a light fine."

Mrs. Ella Tull testified that she gave a birthday party on August 8 and that Gates was among the visitors.

BITTER FIGHT IN NORTH DAKOTA IS NOW NEARING END

BISMARCK, N. D., Oct. 26.—One of the most intense campaigns for state offices waged in any state will come to an end in North Dakota, Oct. 28 with the casting and counting of ballots in its now famous recall election. The three men that the Independent Voters association attempt to recall form the North Dakota industrial commission and it is for the handling of state finances as officers in this body, rather than for individual acts as governor, attorney-general and commissioner of agriculture and labor, that the recall petition has been set in motion. At the same time the recall ballots are cast, voters of the state will be asked to pass upon six measures it is proposed to write upon the statute books of the state at this time through the approval of the voters and also to decide if they desire to accept or reject three amendments to the state constitution. The recall petition proper, asks the removal from office of Lynn J. Frazier, governor; William Lemke, attorney general and John N. Hagen, commissioner of agriculture and labor. The candidates to fill these positions, if vacated, are R. A. Neston of Buxton, for governor, Sveinbjorn Johnson of Grand Forks for attorney general and Joseph A. Kitchin of Sentinel Butte for commissioner of agriculture and labor. Mr. Frazier and Mr. Hagen have held office for six years each while Mr. Lemke took office at the beginning of the present year. Their present terms expire with the end of 1922 and if any are deposed the candidate taking the vacant place will fill out this term. While the battle for these individual places is bitter, so bitter it has passed the stage of argument, an intensive fight of the campaign has been waged over the initiated measures and the constitutional amendments. The initiated measures, if passed, will end what is known in the nomenclature of this state as the "Non-Partisan League Program." The principal item of the initiated measures is the dissolution of the Bank of North Dakota, the taking over of its farm loan business by a Rural Credits association based in part upon the similar organization now functioning in South Dakota, to change certain financial conditions within the state and to provide, by means of two election laws, for separate ballots for candidates for county, state and federal office. The three constitutional amendments provide for a constitutional debt limit and the creating of a sinking

fund for the payment of bonds, and a real estate basis for said bonds, for increase in the pay of the members of the state legislature and of the combination of the office of judge and county clerk in counties of less than 8000 population. While the North Dakota law provides that every voter shall receive a publicity pamphlet, setting forth in full the measures it is proposed to initiate, the same pamphlet presenting the arguments of each side at so much per page, the rival factions have not been content with this method of reaching the voters alone, and candidates and state officials have been in the field in regular old fashioned political meetings for more than a month. Before the votes are counted, many men from outside of the state will take part in the contest.
