PITTOCK CASE REVERSED BY SUPREME COURT

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31.—The state supreme court reversed and remanded the case of F. W. Leadbetter, appellant against O. L. Price, executor of the estate of the late H. L. Pittock of Portland. The suit was based on the allegation that the executor should have listed only half of some real and personal property in which the deceased and Leadbetter were partners.

The decision in the lower court was against Leadbetter and he appealed. The opinion holds that essentially the issue is whether there was a partnership existing between Pittock and Leadbetter at the time of the former's death. The supreme court did not decide whether a partnership actually exists, leaving that to be determined by the lower court, but the opinion today holds that the lower court has jurisdiction in the case.

MILLIONS NOW LIVING WILL NEVER DIE

The following is a review of F. H. Dougherty's address in the Nat Sunday afternoon:

All Christians believe that the Bible is God's Word of truth. All Christians, Catholic and Protestant, agree that the Bible teaches that God created the first man perfect; that this man sinned and was sentenced to death before he begat any children; that he was driven from Eden, and later exercised his divinely given function to beget children, and that his children were all "born in sin and shapen in iniquity" (Psalm 51:5); and that for this reason every one of the human race has been born imperfect, inheriting this imperfection from the first man Adam.—Romans 5:12.

All Christians further agreed that God made a promise to redeem man from death (Hosea 13:14); that he promised Abraham: "In thy seed shall all the families of the earth be blessed" (Genesis 12:3); that later Jesus came to earth; that Jesus was baptized in the Jordan; that he was afterwards crucified upon the cross and arose from the dead and ascended to high.

For the past nineteen hundred years Christians have been preaching these doctrines. If they are true, then the pertinent question is, Why has God permitted the carrying out of such arrangement as above mentioned? What is his real purpose in it? Other Scriptures answer this question conclusively, that his purpose is to provide for the restoration of man to his original perfection and thereby grant to man everlasting life on earth.—Acts 3:19-21.

Every one of the prophets of old foretold that it was God's purpose to grant restoration blessings to the human race. (Acts 3:24). Only a few persons will go to heaven. Jesus said that there would be but a little flock. (Luke 12:32) What, then, will become of the other millions of earth's population? The answer is, God will give them an opportunity to be restored to perfect human conditions. If restoration of the human race is not true, then the promise made to Abraham must be void; the promise to redeem the human race from death could not be true, and the death and resurrection of Jesus would be wholly useless. We know these are all permitted for a purpose and that the perfect wisdom of Jehovah devised this arrangement and he has been carrying it out for the express purpose of blessing mankind.

Jesus plainly said: "I am come that they (the people) might have life and have it more abundantly." (John 10:10) Again he said that he came to give his life a ransom, a purchase price, for man. (Matthew 10:28) Again we read: "God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (John 3:16) Again, that Jesus gave his life a ransom for all, to be testified to all in due time, (1 Timothy 2:5, 6) Unless, then, the opportunity comes to man to know the truth, to obey it, and when obedient to live, these promises are a mockery and Christianity a failure. No Christian will admit that Christianity is a failure, because he knows it will not be. God's Word must accomplish its purpose.—Isaiah 55:11.

This being true, then, all must admit that a time will come when this opportunity for life everlasting will be offered to the people. The question is, When is that time? Uppermost in the minds of the Lord's disciples was this question. They expected the Messianic kingdom to set up some time. He had told them it would happen at the end of the world. He told them he was going away and would return again for them; and because they were so anxious to know when the blessings promised to Abraham would begin they propounded to him this question: "Master, tell us how may we know of your presence and of the end of the world?"

Jesus did not answer this question by telling them that when the due time arrived God would bring forth some strange phenomenon in the skies; but his answer show that the evidence would be such that when the time does arrive every thinking person could understand. Hence he answered that the end of the social and political order existing then, and still existing in a measure, would begin with a world war, followed by famine and pestilence and revolutions in various parts of the earth. (Matthew 24:7) These things had the beginning of their fulfillment in 1914. According to Bible chronology, the gentile times ended there, and Christians expected the trouble to begin, as indeed it did. The famine has come; the pestilence has afflicted the earth; revolution has upset many governments and is now threatening all the social fabric of the world.

Jesus furthermore said that at that time there would be great distress in the earth, men's hearts failing them for fear of what they see coming on the earth (Luke 21:25, 26); and now we see this fulfilled.

He further states that as it was in the days of Noah, so should it be at the end of the world. In Noah's day there were giants in the earth. At the present time there are giants. The giants in Noah's day were typical of the giants of this time. At present there are giant corporations which are absorbing all the smaller ones and controlling all the business interests
