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GO TO CHURCH SUNDAY PROVES GREAT SUCCESS

Medford's first "Go to Church Sunday" was a great success in every way, all of the churches being crowded to capacity both morning and evening, and the sermons being of a high order throughout. Brief accounts of the services from some of the churches follow:

First Methodist "It has been a wonderful day!" This characterization of Go to Church Sunday was on the lips of scores of people who were in the audiences which taxed the seating capacity of First Methodist Episcopal church at both regular services yesterday. The Sunday school and Epworth League services "ran high" with interest and in attendance.

Bishop Wm. O. Shepard delivered a masterful sermon at the evening service on "The Church in the New Age." He showed that the church with its message of the gospel of love is the most powerful civilizing and cultural agency in the world.

At the morning service the pastor preached on "The Church, the Servant of the Community," emphasizing the fact that the church can justify its existence only in service. He said that the church is a servant of the community in that it holds before the people the loftiest ideal, furnishes sanctuary for the soul, and gives a Christian citizenship.

The music at all the services was commented upon as being of the highest order. Characteristic of the day was the lack of denominational emphasis.

Christian Church The morning service at 11 a. m., was largely attended, the auditorium being filled, many new faces were present, some for the first time in the Christian church.

Though the pastor was sick and hardly able to be present from influenza and a severe cold, many were heard to say it was the best sermon he had ever preached in Medford and one lady went so far as to call up the pastor after church and tell him that if being sick caused him to preach such sermons, she hoped he would be sick every Sunday.

The theme for discussion was, "The Most Neglected Privilege of the Christian Church." This privilege, said the speaker, was prayer, which is the Christian's stronghold, and to deny prayer and its power is to deny the instincts of the human race, for man has ever prayed, and further to deny prayer is to deny the Holy Scriptures, for most of the great promises of the Bible are connected with prayer.

To deny the power and necessity of prayer is to say that Jesus Christ is not a safe exemplar for He both taught and practiced prayer.

The evening service was largely attended, the auditorium being well filled. The music by the male quartet was well taken and the solo by Mr. Seoulang was a gem.

As a whole the First Christian Church believes the Go to Church Sunday was a decided success from many angles and believes the results will be lasting, and wishes to thank the Mail Tribune for its hearty support, timely editorial aid and encouragement in the project.

First Baptist Church Large audiences were present at both services at the First Baptist church. At the evening service all seats were taken and many chairs used. The presence of strangers was marked, and a splendid spirit was manifest. Go to Church Sunday was a Red Letter day for the Baptists. The sacred concert was said to be equal if not superior to any given by the choir since the coming of Mr. Walker. There was a pleasing variety, and the quality of work elicited many favorable comments on the part of the hundreds present.

Rev. F. R. Leach gave two forceful messages on "The Value of Church Going." Among other things the speaker said, the present decline in church attendance is due to the larger place given today to pleasures; to the rush in the business life; to the misunderstanding of the real program of the churches; and to indifference and carelessness on the part of the people, rather than to any hostility to the church itself. Non church going is resulting in making the people irreligious, in lowering the morals of the nation, and is a blow at our institutions. Church attendance is a duty every person owes to himself, to his country, to the community and to God. It is a cowardly act to want the church for the sake of the community, the wife and the children and in case of sickness and death, and not support its services. The renewal of the church going habit is one of the greatest needs of the hour. Religion will soon vanish with the absence of church attendance, said the speaker.

WILL ENDEAVOR TO ENCIRCLE WORLD WITH THE AIRPLANE

PARIS.—At the great airway congress now being organized in Paris in conjunction with the autumn Aero Show, an effort is to be made to join up missing links in the world airchain. Should this be accomplished a path round the world by air in 408 hours and at a cost of about 680 pounds would be one of the possibilities of the future. Airway experts are now ready to specify the machines and map out the route.

Leaving London at 8 a. m., on Monday, they say Constantinople could be reached at 4 a. m., on Tuesday and Cairo the same day.

Then with a berth booked on an air leviathan, Sydney, Australia, would be reached at 10 a. m., the following Tuesday.

After this, taking the Pacific in another great air voyage, they figure that the passenger would arrive at San Francisco at 4 p. m., on Saturday.

The next stage would be the Trans-American route to New York which would be reached at 10 p. m., on Monday to take another air liner to London where it would arrive at 8 a. m. on Thursday.

The distance covered would be 27,000 miles in the space of 17 days. This would put Jules Verne's 80-days trip badly in the shade.

M. F. Sheets sang as a tenor solo, MacDermid's arrangement of the 131st Psalm. All felt that the service, song and sermon were of special interest and help.

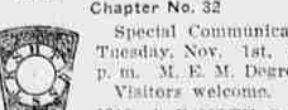
Tonight, Monday, the young people will have a Halloween social (in costume, where desired, but without masking) at Clyde Hall, with games, light refreshments, etc.
