LONDON, Nov. 1.—(By Associated Press.) Possible legislation to put the Ulster parliament in a better position was indicated by Prime Minister Lloyd George yesterday in the house of commons in answering critics in the debate on the unionist motion intended as a censure of the government's Irish policy.
