

PRIZE AWARDS ON BOX APPLES ARE GIVEN OUT

Judges Declare Exhibit Best Ever Seen in Southern Oregon—Great Difficulty Experienced in Selecting Winners—Upton Brothers Win.

The judging of the apples at the Rogue River Valley Apple exposition for the awards offered was no small undertaking. In many instances it was next to impossible to decide with the naked eye which of a number of entries were entitled to the first, second or third prize.

The apples were all judged by a marking which the judges agreed upon should be followed. This included uniformity, color, size and free from blemishes. In the three box contest the

Judges removed all of the apples out of six boxes belonging to Upton Bros., and the Bear Creek Orchard and examined each apple with a microscope for blemishes. Never before has there been such perfect fruit exhibited in Medford and the award was given Upton Bros. only after a most thorough inspection.

The judging of the apples was done by Prof. F. C. Reimer of the Southern Oregon Experiment Station, C. C. Lemmon of the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association and M. E. Root of Denny & Co., fruit distributors.
