MEETING ASHLAND TONIGHT TO TALK OVER NEW HOTEL

ASHLAND, Nov. 2.—Tonight, at city hall, the hotel problem will be tackled again at a public meeting called for this special purpose. This meeting is the outcome of the project as outlined at a chamber of commerce gathering a fortnight ago. There will be no solicitation whatever, merely a talkfest regarding the outlook in general, as a preliminary to going ahead and securing tangible results if the decision is settled to embark in the enterprise. All are invited to attend this meeting, which will be a rally in behalf of the new hotel project, to be secured if possible by holding out as an inducement a generous subsidy in the way of a good-sized bonus. Public sentiment is crystallizing in favor of the hotel movement as the logical reinforcement to our park, scenic and mineral springs advantages, unsurpassed.

Another bronze tablet will honor Ashland soldier boys, this one representing high school students as a memorial, six of whom sacrificed their lives in the world war. This tablet will be placed on the right wall of the high school entrance, and will be dedicated on Armistice Day with appropriate exercises.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Newell Wright, now residents of the vicinity of Huhl, Idaho, have lately received a reminder that a daughter was born to this couple on Oct. 27.

The Women's Foreign Missionary society of the Methodist church will meet with Mrs. C. F. Tilton, at her home on Almond street, on Friday of this week. The King's Daughters of the same denomination following will meet, on Saturday, with Miss Alice Pratt as hostess.

Glenn Fabrick and L. Ringer, of Medford, were here recently accompanying a number of district laundry managers in a tour of this town's surroundings, preliminary to a meeting of laundries in that city. Without sottofaping our home people in regard to local advantages, the visitors, nevertheless, thought Ashland folks were up to starchy in developing natural resources and extending welcome hospitalities.

Another golden wedding is of record. Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Arant having celebrated that event Oct. 29 at the family home on Nursery street. Mr. Arant came to Oregon from Illinois in 1852; and for a long time was a resident of Klamath county, having been the first superintendent of the Crater Lake national park, the family now being residents of Ashland.

At the Sunday morning service at Trinity Episcopal, Mrs. Gladys Shortridge sang, as an offertory solo, "Hail Thou Mine Hand."

The Community clubhouse entertainment netted over \$100 from the reading given by Dr. Mattie Shaw, Oct. 28. The Congregationalists seized about \$70, proceeds from their recent New England dinner, thanks to a great extent to the horde of hungry Methodists who invaded the well appointed dining tables which were spread so generously by the Cong. people.

Rev. C. A. Edwards, Methodist pastor, is on the way to Chicago, in attendance upon a world conference of church leaders and missionaries.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. McNair have adopted a babe, the infant being a fine seven-months old boy. This kind act on the part of the foster parents is in line with the example set by others, with the result that probably a score of children have found homes in the best of families hereabouts, assured of every attention which the prompting of affectionate regard can afford. A missionary rally was held at the Christian church on Tuesday, led by a returned worker from the distant field of India. Local speakers supplemented the missionary visitor from abroad, the meeting having begun in the morning, and continued through the evening hours when adoption effects were employed to more effectively illustrate the subject of various themes.

The reparations commission has awarded A. R. Brown, rancher east of Ashland, \$500 for havoc created in the highway bombardment zone, a requisition for double that amount having been made. Some of Brown's buildings, especially the barn, might perhaps resemble the Rheims cathedral we read as much about. The roof is perforated by flying rocks, both nave and transept are wrecked, while nothing remains where the cloisters were located. This heavy damage was done by blasting incident to relocation of the Pacific Highway on a level out of reach of high water when the irrigation dam is at full tide. All the ranchers out in that locality wore heavy armor and gas masks while tilling the soil when bombardment activities were at their crest.

PHOENIX MEN TO HEAR PROF. REIMER FRIDAY

The men of Phoenix and vicinity will have a treat Friday night, November 4, at the Brotherhood meeting at Clyde Hall, Phoenix, when Professor F. C. Reimer will speak on "How the Japanese and Chinese Really Feel Towards America."

This address will give Professor Reimer's first-hand impressions gathered on his two recent trips to Japan and into the interior of China in the interests of the Oregon Agricultural Experiment service. It will be a rare opportunity to learn actual facts bearing directly on international and Pacific problems which concern America, particularly and must be considered at the coming conference on disarmament and Pacific problems, called by President Harding to meet November 11th at Washington.

During the evening there will be music and light refreshments, and an important business session of the brotherhood. All members and other men of the community are especially invited to be present, and to gather promptly at 7:30. This time it will be a "men only" night.

Local Meat Market Changes Ownership

Medford is on the eve of a big improvement in business conditions. This is the opinion of the Stanley Brothers, probably the largest stock-raisers in Jackson county. They have just purchased the City Meat Market, known generally as the Warner, Wortman & Gore market.

It has been the invariable custom heretofore for cattlemen in this county to ship their choice beef either north or south for the markets of Portland or San Francisco. As a consequence, local people have had to be content with the meat which was not shipped, in other words, the culls. Stanley Bros., have not sold a head this fall, and will not.

There have been several buyers in this year, as usual, to buy the Stanley cattle. These cattle represent the result of many years of careful breeding for beef stock, thoroughbred Hereford bulls being used exclusively. Some of these bulls, which are changed frequently to prevent inbreeding, have been brought from as far away as Montana. By careful selection and attention, a splendid type of strictly beef cattle has been developed which commands the top market price.

The price of beef on the hoof is very low this year. The price of meat retail has gone down very little. Stanley Brothers have figured it out with the result that they are now prepared to furnish Medford and vicinity with choice beef steers at a very reasonable price. From their large herds they can select the year through the beef cattle best suited to be killed at that particular time. Thus the consumer will get always the best beef to be procured.

The opening of this market along the above lines is a big step forward for Medford, bringing this city on a par with Portland and other metropolitan cities as regards its beef supply. It indicates a confidence on the part of the Stanley Brothers in the future of our city.

The efficient and popular meat cutter, Walter Erskine, will be retained. Otto Handt, famous for his Manzanita hams and bacon and wienies will continue also. With these two experienced men will work the Stanley Brothers and also Harry Rerford, the latter of the well known Lakeview family of stockmen.

Stanley Brothers plan to continue permanently in the retail meat business, opening up branch shops as required, and also wholesaling to camps, etc. Medford will be their headquarters, and it is a Medford enterprise from start to finish.—Adv.

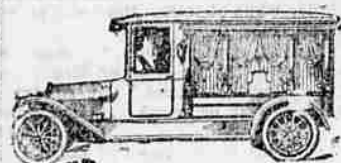
