

# ARMISTICE DAY PROGRAM FULL OF NEW STUNTS

According to committee reports last night at the meeting of the American Legion, the Armistice day celebration machinery is all in motion and working smoothly. The program as finally given out is believed to hold some interest for practically every one. Over 4000 programs of the day's events together with a personal invitation to attend have been mailed out to families in southern Oregon and northern California.

Churches of the city will hold special services beginning at 7:30 p. m.

Business men and fraternal and civic organizations are giving fine support to the project and indications point to a real gala day for Medford. The city will be decorated, an immense parade will march promptly at 1:30, business houses will be open in the morning while a squad of fun-makers will be busy on the streets from 9 a. m. until the parade starts.

A feature will be the presence of real M. P.'s—the chaps who made life a bore for the doughboys. The tables will be turned this time however, as the military police will have no authority. The result is expected to be terrific.

A free exposition of Rogue River valley apples opens at 10 a. m. in the chamber of commerce building.

11 a. m. is given over to celebration of the hour which marked the signing of the armistice three years ago.

Medford high school will meet the Albany high school in a game of football at 11:15 a. m., which is expected to be a great fight.

A parade comprising beautiful floats representative of military, civic and fraternal organizations and led by Colonel E. E. Kelly, marshal of the day, and city officials will start at 1:30 p. m.

The Ladies' Auxiliary will act as hostess to all ladies who wish to attend the reception at the Legion hall at 3 p. m. Refreshments and a program is promised.

No boxing card of recent years in southern Oregon has brought together the class of pugilists who will feature the big smoker which begins at 3 p. m. Frankie O'Brien of Portland will meet Ben Dixon in a ten round go as the main attraction. Johnny Carlson and Billy Ryan will also mix and several other good bouts will be provided.

In the city park a band concert will be given at 7 p. m. and at 9 p. m. the annual Armistice day ball opens in the Natorium. Anyone who has ever attended one of the legion's annual Armistice day dances knows the standard for this entertainment is high and the ball this year will be up to standard, if not better than those given heretofore.

## ATTORNEY BOGGS ASSISTS STATE IN GOODWIN TRIAL

Selection of a jury to try the case of the state against John Goodwin, Medford taxi driver, charged with selling intoxicating liquor began in the circuit court this morning, and was still in progress at the noon recess. The defense was represented by Attorneys George M. Roberts and Gus Newbury and the state by District Attorney Rawley Moore and Attorney O. C. Boggs, the latter being associated with the prosecution at the request of Medford churches and organizations.

A large delegation of women, some of whom brought their babies and their knitting occupied seats in the court room, and followed the questioning of the jurors with keen attention. Among the spectators were the Rev. D. E. Millard and Rev. E. J. Lawrence.

In the questioning of the jurors many of them were asked if the presence of any person or persons in the courtroom would influence their verdict, and if they had heard any pulp remarks condemning the bootlegger, or the defense thereof.

The state objected to the use of the word "stoopid" in referring to certain state witnesses, but the court overruled the objection, whereupon Attorney Newbury for the defense, explained to the jury "that the state of Oregon had seen fit to dignify the term with the name of 'special agent'."

The state in its questioning asked the jurors if they believed in the county expending money in the prosecution of bootleggers, and some of them replied "not if it was carried too far." They were also asked if they believed in the principle of the prohibition law, and two L. E. Murphy of Ashland and Peter Betz of Eagle Point flatfootedly stated they did not, and had voted against the measure. They, however, did not think their views would prevent them from giving both sides a fair and impartial trial. Some of the jurors served on the Edwards and Wolgast cases.

It is expected that the jury in the case will be selected early this afternoon, and that the case will go to the jury late today or early tomorrow morning.

The principal witness for the state will be A. B. Gates, a special detective, who, it is alleged purchased a bottle of liquor from Goodwin, the defendant, following a trip to the Applegate last August, on the pretense that he desired to inspect a creamery in that district. The alleged sale it will be contended, was made on a side street in the business district.

tion to its soldiers arises by reason of economic handicap suffered by them because of their service, which economic handicap is at this time felt with especial severity because of widespread general unemployment; and

"Whereas, after careful consideration of all the arguments advanced in opposition to the measure, including the letter of the secretary of the treasury and the address of the president to congress, we still firmly believe in the justice, fairness and immediate necessity of the adjusted compensation measure; now, therefore

"Be it resolved, that the American Legion, in national convention assembled reaffirms its stand upon adjusted compensation and asks that the congress of the United States pass this measure without further equivocation or delay."
