CENTRAL POINT, Nov. 4.—One of the most important real estate deals made here by C. S. Sanderson during the past week was the one whereby the Owens property belonging to Mrs. Julia Owens, widow of the late W. E. Owens, one of the prominent pioneer residents of the valley, was sold to A. P. Weiss, a recent arrival in the valley. Mr. Weiss and family will move into the new home here soon from Medford where they have been residing temporarily. Mr. Weiss also made a trade with A. A. Gillette of this city recently giving for some of Mr. Gillette's land here in town, some timber land out of the city limits, which he owned but which he didn't think would be as useful to him now as city land would be.

ASHLAND DEFEATS SPECIAL \$18,000 BOND REFUNDING

ASHLAND, Nov. 4.—Banquets, budgets and bonds have attracted most attention the current week. The local school budget of district No. 5 was adopted overwhelmingly on Monday by a vote of 65 to 10. The maximum requirements are \$83,412.50, of which \$55,612.50 is to be raised by district tax, practically all of the latter sum being required to meet teachers' salaries. The schools are crowded, with the result that the demand for another building will have to be met in due season.

Some "potential" objections seem to have been filed at the special bond election on Wednesday, the proposition to issue \$18,000 in the "potential" classification having been defeated, the vote standing 25 majority against the plan. It is conceded, however, that this money has got to be raised sooner or later, and it only follows that in due season a committee on ways will have to devise means to meet the obligations which are pressing ones.

If anybody wants to register a kick against the Ashland municipal budget in general, they had better file it on or before Nov. 25, as this date fixes the limitation by way of demurrer proceedings. The levy for 1922 will be 13.7 mills, as against 20.9 for 1921, or by way of further comparison, the amount to be raised is \$49,961.18 as provided in the 1922 budget, \$52,887.27 having been the figures for 1921. A co-operative body of seven freeholders, looking very wise if not bored, participated with the council in reviewing the budget estimates on Tuesday evening. This feature is in accordance with a new law, and is the first instance it has been invoked locally. Acquiescence was in order, perfunctorily to such an extent as the average director of an organization approves the formal financial statement of his corporation. The respective levies of the two years follow:

Naturally, the biggest item in the budget is to meet bond interest in the sum of \$18,919.31.

Incidentally school children will assist in augmenting the attendance by distributing card announcements all over town. In summing up audience proportions, the particular schoolroom which has distributed the highest number of these admission cards will be presented with a handsome American flag. Thus does prohibition reflect the spirit of patriotism on a 50-50 basis by enlisting the services of youthful and efficient co-workers.

C. W. Nims, of this city, grand commander of the Templar organization in Oregon, left for Tillamook on Thursday, accompanied by other grand officers from Salem and Portland, to supervise the installation of a new commandery organization at the cheese center of the big dairy section of the state.

Friday, Nov. 18, is a date reserved by the local Eastern Star chapter for a leading industrial, commercial and social event, the holiday season being anticipated by the holding of a bazaar incorporating a lot of entertainment features. Arrangements are already underway in perfecting the settings for this attractive exhibit to the accompaniments of a merry and festive gathering.
