CANADA AND U. S. REACH AGREEMENT ON LIQUOR TRADE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—American prohibition officials and Canadian officials have entered into a "Gentlemen's agreement" designed to reduce smuggling of liquor across the border to a minimum.

The plan is to prevent the shipment of liquor from the United States into Canada intended for re-shipment back into this country by requiring the consent of officials of the Canadian province involved before American liquor is permitted to enter Canada.
