### WOMEN TALK FASTER, ESPECIALLY FAT ONES

REDDING, Cal., Nov. 8.—Women are faster talkers than men by forty words a minute, according to James Beard, court reporter of Shasta county. Beard arrived at his decision, he declares, after seven years experience in taking testimony as a court reporter.

The average woman, Beard asserts, talks 200 words a minute. Large, stout women talk faster than small women. Men average from 140 to 160 words a minute.

Moreover, women talk more steadily than men do, he says; once a woman starts a sentence she nearly always finishes it.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—A "decided upward tendency in traffic" was the cause of a decision of the directors of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy today to purchase 7500 freight cars, 55 heavy freight and passenger engines and 127 all-steel passenger cars. It was announced by President Hale Holden. More than 11,000 men have been added to the company's pay roll to take care of increased traffic since last March, Mr. Holden said.
