MANY ELECTIONS ARE HELD TODAY THRUOUT COUNTRY

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Legislative and local contests featured the annual fall elections throughout the country today. Only one state, Virginia, was electing a governor. Supporters of State Senator E. Lee Trinkle, the democratic candidate, and Henry D. Anderson, republican, claimed their favorite's election by pluralities of 59,000 and 25,000 respectively. A particularly bitter fight was made in Kentucky by republicans and democrats in which the house now is republican and the senate democrat by one. In Louisville five tickets, including the Lincoln Independents, negroes, presented city tickets. New York, Maryland and New Jersey were to elect legislatures. In New Jersey strict enforcement of the Van Ness prohibition act was made an issue by the republicans, while democrats favored its modification. The principal mayoralty elections are in New York City, Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Toledo and Louisville.

(Continued from Page One) At the beginning of the afternoon session Mike F. Hanley and Ed H. Helms were excused by the state. S. L. Blakeley and W. F. Biddle were excused by the defense. During the questioning of jurors, the district attorney was assisted by members of the sheriff's office. The question of "reasonable doubt" was also brought up in the examination. The courtroom was crowded at the afternoon session, and many of these were residents of Eagle Point. Mason Lofland called as a juror was asked by Attorney Reames and to his reply that he had never expressed an opinion on the case, was interrogated at great length regarding a conversation he had last week. Mr. Lofland could not recall the incident. He was excused by the defense.

7 BOILED SHIRTS SHOW UP OPENING MOSCOW G. OPERA

MOSCOW—Boiled shirts made their reappearance here at the opening performance of grand opera. There were seven of them and not one was the sort that one scrubs with a sponge. This extremely bourgeois attire was an announcement that starch has arrived in the Moscow markets with the changed economic policy. The entire audience in the great opera house heralded the advent of a new era in Russia. Seats were sold in the old-time way. It cost 84,000 rubles to have an excellent seat in the pit or first balcony and the seats were all full as well as in the galleries. The mammoth auditorium is just as brilliant in its dull gold and red interior as it was in the days of the czar. The initial opera was Glinka's "Russland und Ladmihla." It was brilliantly staged.

There was a marked difference between the opera crowd this year and that of three years ago. In the opening months of the soviet regime, bolshevists of both sexes nearly all wore black leather coats, which they dramatized very heavily at the opera and in all public places. The absorption of a large bourgeois population and three years of experience in government have changed the dominant party. The members have softened and become more conventional.

The percentage of bobbed-haired, masculine looking women is smaller. Femininity is reasserting itself. The old-time Russian courtesy is reappearing in all gatherings. Red army soldiers are now generally shaved and have their boots polished. The constant lecturing of the immaculate Trotsky has sunk into the army. He is a great stickler for proper care of clothing and equipment and the same word has been generally passed along in all government departments.

FOUR SHOT IN I. C. HOLDUP

porter, two wounds in abdomen. Ben Bovinette, Mattoon, mail clerk, shot in shoulder, abdomen and wrist; slugged on head.

Thomas Baker, Carbondale, mail clerk, beaten over the head with butt of revolver.

H. H. Bangs, Chicago, fireman, slightly wounded three times in the left shoulder.

Kenneth Knowlton, University of Illinois student, slightly wounded in right arm.

A colored train porter was the only man seriously injured by the robbers, he being shot in the chest and groin as he stood on the vestibule of one car. The fireman was wounded in the shoulder, a mail clerk was shot in the hand and shoulder and another was clubbed over the head with a revolver.

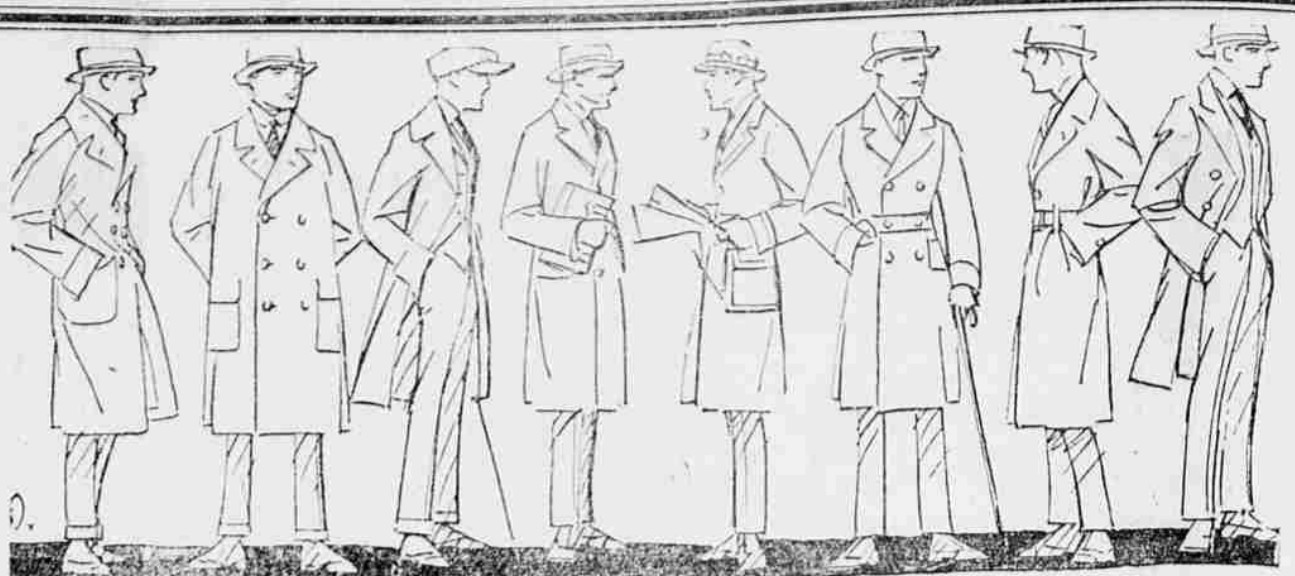
Cover Engine Crew Two of the robbers boarded the train at some point between Chicago and Paxton and covered the engine crew with their guns as the train was passing through here, according to the report of Division Superintendent J. W. Hevron. They ordered the engineer to proceed to a bridge where the train was stopped with the passenger coaches on the bridge.

Ordering the crew to break the train the engineer and fireman were forced to pull the mail car up the tracks and about eight other men appeared from their automobiles. On a threat of shooting the engineer and fireman of the train if the mail car was not opened, the robbers forced the mail clerks to open the door, but when the engineer and fireman had clambered inside the door was slammed shut.

Several charges of dynamit and firing from revolvers and shotguns finally forced the door in and a hand to hand battle ensued which only stopped after the robbers had thrown two bombs into the car and a firebrand which smoked out the four men in the car.

During the fight the mail clerks and fireman were injured. These men were forced to throw out the red-sealed sacks containing the registered mail and then jumped from the burning car. The bandits escaped in their automobiles.

The train crew hooked up the train again without the mail car and proceeded to Champagne where the injured were sent to a hospital.
