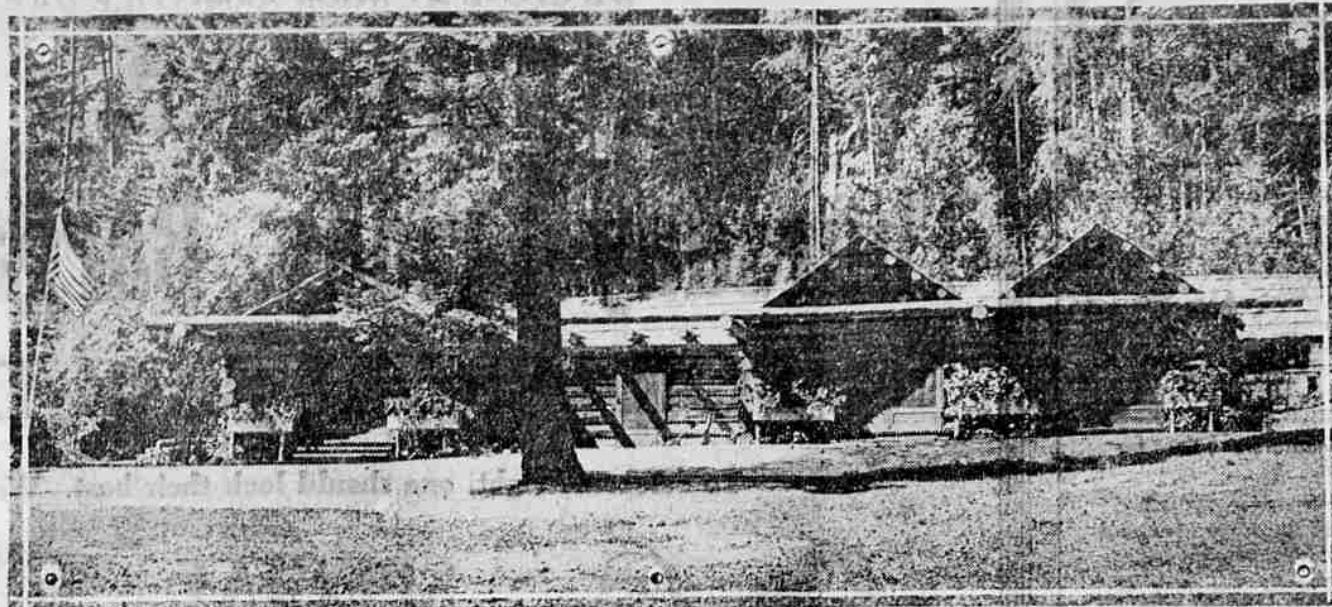

The House That Sap and Salt Built

Here is a picture of "Sap-and-Salt-in-the-Woods." The site is six miles up the Ashland Creek Canyon, Jesse Winburn built it, and here he and I live together. Jesse is a retired business man. For 30 years he controlled the advertising in all the surface street cars of New York City. In that time he probably made contracts for advertising that ran into more money than any other one man in America. A year or so ago he sold out his business and began to figure out how he could best enjoy himself.

First, he took a trip to the Orient, and on the way to the steamer he was deeply impressed by the scenic wonders of Southern Oregon. All the time he was away he kept thinking about the mountains, valleys, canyons, rivers, springs, forests and orchards he had seen around Ashland, Ore. He particularly remembered an ancient log cabin, built by old man Long 39 years ago, in the midst of 160 acres of virgin forest, six miles up the canyon from the postoffice. The place was for sale, and he bought it.

He and I went up there this spring and lived in the little cabin. There

was but one room, and things were just about as primitive as you find them anywhere. The roof leaked, and there was a lot of wild that blew through the cracks between the logs. We puttered around for a few weeks getting our bearings. Then Jesse decided to enlarge the place, put in modern conveniences and make it a retreat for newspaper men and advertisers.

The living quarters are in the section at the extreme left of the picture. There is just one big room here, with a fireplace ten feet across. Much of the furniture in this room I made with my own hands. It is sturdy furniture, with a strong leaning toward the rustic, and is guaranteed to last 99 years. It cannot be duplicated in any furniture store in the wide world.

The next section is the shell of the old Long cabin itself. Many initials are cut deep in the logs, carved by hikers who came up the six-mile climb during the last quarter of a century. Most of these initials are of young men and young women in love, for to log and in public places is a sure sign of either sincerity or silliness. I don't know which. In this section Mrs. Weston, the housekeeper, does

the cooking, while Mr. Weston, a manager things around the outside of the place. He milks the cow and sees to it that the horses get a liberal application of hay and oats every night. This couple come from sturdy New England stock, and their way of talking carries a strong down east flavor. They are just about as fine a pair of lovers as you can find anywhere in the States even if they do have live in their bones and are no longer young. We used to have Joe, the Chinaman, do the cooking, but Mrs. Weston alone is easily worth all the Chinamen on the whole Pacific coast.

We make our own butter from Frances Elizabeth's milk, raise our own vegetables, chop our own wood and have our own water supply, piping it from a branch of the creek some 800 feet back of the cabin. And such water it is! With it to drink, the privations caused by the last constitutional amendment are easier to bear.

Mr. Weston has been hinting around lately that he would like to have some chickens to care for. In spite of our warnings that the hawks or the peacocks or some other wild things would get them; but he thinks he is smart enough to outwit these predatory creatures, and the chances are he will get the chickens.

The two sections at the right con-

tain the bathroom, the shower, and spray and the bedrooms. The position at the extreme right covers my tools and work bench, where I make furniture and things of all sorts. I find my head works better when I do a lot of work with my hands.

The flowers in the boxes across the front are geraniums, and such geraniums you never saw before! I got the soil in which they grow from around the old barn that Long built years and years ago. It was as black as Patty Arbuckle's reputation, and when you take some of the soil between the fingers it is so rich you can fairly "feel" its fertility. Some of the leaves on the geranium plants are almost as big as straw hats, and the blooms are just as big as red can be. Both men and flowers flourish best when you put them in the right environment.

The place is called "Sap-and-Salt-in-the-Woods" because here are created the little paragraphs you see every day in the Telegrams under the title of "Sap and Salt." Winburn liked the stuff so well he induced me to come here and write it, and he further did me the fine honor of naming the place after my work.

Of course, I think Jesse is just about the finest fellow that ever was

WOMAN ELECTED CO. SUPERVISOR SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—Complete returns from 499 out of 506 precincts in yesterday's municipal election disclosed today that Miss Margaret Mary Morgan, printing office manager and club woman, was named as county supervisor, the first woman to hold such an office in San Francisco.

The election developed several surprises, chief of which was the defeat of three incumbent supervisors, Fred Himer, Charles A. Nelson and Fred Schip and the naming of five new supervisors among the nine elected. The new supervisors are Angelo Rossi, Frank H. Robb, John A. McGregor, former president of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding corporation here; Miss Morgan and possibly Frank H. Harris.

E. E. Schmitz, former mayor is running third in the supervisory list of nine.

Edmond Godchaux is re-elected recorder over Thomas Powers, and William Hynes is re-elected public administrator over Milo E. Kent on the face of returns up to ten o'clock.

Edward F. Bryant, re-elected tax collector; George Lull, re-elected city attorney; John E. McDougall, re-elected treasurer; Niel S. O'Brien and Sylvian S. Lazarus, re-elected police judges, and seven nominees of the mayor endorsed for the board of education, complete the ballot.
