

### NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

### LINE OF MARCH FOR BIG PARADE IS ANNOUNCED

Attention of those who are to participate in the parade tomorrow is called to the fact that all should be in readiness at 1:30 p. m. Ex-service men are requested to be on hand in uniform if possible but to get in line whether in uniform or "civvies."

The different sections will form as follows:

Main and Oakdale—G. A. R. rifle and drum corps; G. A. R. W. R. C., Spanish War Veterans.

North Oakdale—Ex-service men and women; D. O. K. K. band.

South Laurel—Women's Auxiliary American Legion; city mayors and councilmen of Medford and neighboring cities; National Guard; Ashland band.

South Mistletoe—B. O. P. E.; I. O. O. F.; High School band; Y. W. C. A.; school children; Boy Scouts.

Main west of Mistletoe—Decorated cars.

South Oakdale—Floats.

The parade will follow a line of march on Main street from Oakdale to Riverside; on Riverside to Sixth; on Sixth to Bartlett; on Bartlett back to Main street.

The committee will have a place for every organization or float and in case anyone has been overlooked in the lineup it is requested that they be on hand and be taken care of by the committee in charge.

### RED CROSS ROLL CALL WILL START ARMISTICE DAY

The annual roll call for membership for the Red Cross officially opens on Armistice day in every part of the United States. The local committee for street work will be active on the streets of Medford and everyone should be prepared to re-enlist in the ranks of this most worthy cause. The roll call will continue until November 24 when the entire county will have been covered.

This date marks a most important period in the history of the local chapter. It closes a year of its greatest usefulness in peace times in Jackson county. There has never been a time when the just demands of this county were so many and so varied, the local chapter has met them promptly and to the full extent of its resources.

The roll call must in no way be confounded with the solicitation for the sustenance fund which has just closed. The local chapter cannot do its great work on the membership fees only and the business houses of the city have been asked to maintain an auxiliary fund.

Armistice day also marks the reorganization of the Junior Red Cross which is expected to be 1500 strong. The roll call is a national membership which needs your support. It is a privilege to contribute one dollar each year to its program which is the biggest, broadest and best in the world. It is typically American.

### WEEK OF PRAYER Y. M. C. A. NOV. 13

November 13-19 will be observed throughout America as a Week of Prayer for young men. This season is annually reserved for this purpose by the Y. M. C. A.'s of North America in connection with the World's Alliance of Y. M. C. A.'s, which embraces 9000 Young Men's Christian Associations. A message from Dr. John R. Mott, chief executive secretary for North American associations, calls upon all Christians to unite to this end. He says: "What may not this concert of prayer by Christians of all nations and races mean if characterized by reality, intensity and unity!"

Churches throughout the county will be asked to cooperate in the observance.

### LABOR BOARD CUTS RATE OF PAY ON SOUTHERN ROAD

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—Rates of pay for virtually all classes of railroad employes on the New Orleans and Great Northern Railroad company were cut yesterday in a decision by the United States railroad labor board to the scale existing March 1, 1920.

The decision said the road was not a party to the case involving the recent wage decrease of July 1, last. The wage cut announced today, going further than the one ordered last July would take away the increase granted the railroad employes in May, 1920.

A. O. Wharton and W. L. McMenimen, labor members of the board, dissented from the majority opinion. Wharton pointed out several specific instances where he declared experienced workmen had their wages reduced below those in other classes of less experience.

Train and engine service employes were returned without qualification to the rates of pay in effect March 1, 1920, but rates for shop crafts and round house laborers were specified by the board, class by class and station agents were similarly rated.

The decision said the road's representatives testified to an operating deficit of \$500,000 for the year 1920 and a further operating deficit of \$95,000 for the first half of 1921.

"By this decision the board has decreed that a laborer who has heretofore generally received a rate higher than that paid a section laborer shall now be paid a wage of \$9.20 for a full week," Wharton's dissenting opinion said.


