YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Nov. 10.—Mayor-elect Oles, elected Tuesday, started business here with a barrel of potatoes and a wheelbarrow. Now he has one of the largest food businesses in the city, conducting a market in a former theater on the public square.

PASCO BOOTLEGGER SUES PARTNER FOR HALF COURT COSTS

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 10.—The most unique case ever filed in the history of the northwest, according to local attorneys, was instituted yesterday at Pasco, Franklin county, Wash., by Mike Boca in suing his former partner, John Edwards for \$99 to cover the cost of attorney's fees and costs which were paid by Boca when the latter was recently arrested and fined \$175 for having intoxicating liquor in his possession.

Boca alleges in his complaint that he and Edwards entered into an agreement when they went into the bootlegging business that each partner would be responsible for half of the costs in the event that the other partner was arrested. After Boca's arrest, he pleaded guilty and was fined, which together with his attorney fee amounted to \$198. Half of this amount, Boca alleges, should be paid by Edwards according to a written agreement made prior to their entering into the "bootlegging business."

Under the community property laws of Washington Mrs. Edwards is made a party to the suit.

FIRE LOSS OREGON OCTOBER \$170,515

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 10.—Fire losses in Oregon for the month of October aggregated a loss of \$170,515, according to the monthly report of A. C. Barber, state fire marshal. The most important losses in the state were:

At Baker, warehouse, elevator and contents \$35,000; at Bandon, theater, lodge room and contents \$15,000; at Junction City, store and part of contents \$13,000; at Medford, apartment house \$20,000; at Union, planing mill \$18,000.

The total number of fires was thirty.

SPOKANE FARMER IS VICTIM OF BANDIT

SPOKANE, Nov. 10.—A man believed to be William Ry, a farmer, was found on an outlying street today, with two bullet wounds in his body and suffering from exposure. Chances for his recovery are believed to be slight.

A cheap revolver was found near him and the ground showed signs of a struggle. His watch was missing and only a few cents were found in his pockets. Police said his injuries could not have been self-inflicted.

U. S. Steel Tonnage Drops

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The monthly tonnage report of the United States Steel corporation, made public today, showed 4,286,829 tons of unfilled orders on hand October 31. This is a decline from unfilled orders on September 30, which were 4,561,570.
