The beautiful days we are now enjoying are spurring the farmer on with his fall plowing and sowing with a vim that the onlooker takes to mean that these days are not here to stay.

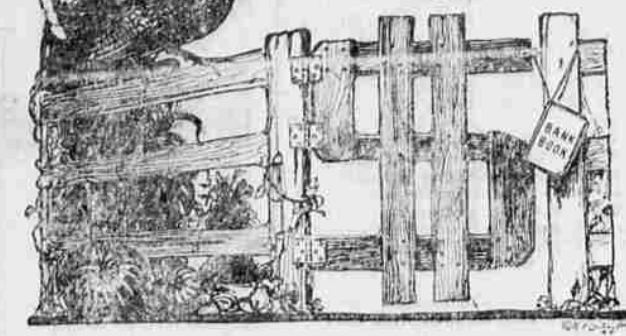

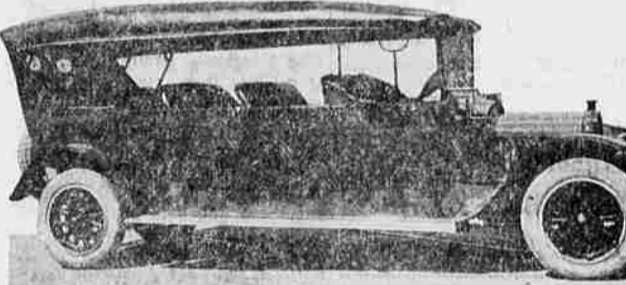
