

# LIBRARY EARNS \$32 PER MONTH ON BOOK FINES

Local Institution Popular One With Medford and Jackson County People—Book Circulation Increased 24 Per Cent Last 10 Months.

That the people of Medford and Jackson county are realizing more fully the value of a first-class public library such as it has in the Medford public library is shown by the large increase in the local, county and rural books in circulation. During the first ten months of 1920 the local circulation was 42,464. During the corresponding months this year the local circulation has been 52,613. These figures show a 24 per cent increase. This increase came entirely during the summer and early fall and was almost all in the circulation of children's books. New books acquired by the library are as many for the first ten months of this year as for the entire year last year and roughly number 1,800. Fines for the first ten months of last year total \$368.91, while for the same period of time this year they amount to \$392.92.

All incorporated town in the county except Ashland and Phoenix support a branch of the central library situated in this city. These branches are supervised by local people and are allowed \$30 worth of magazine subscriptions throughout the year in addition to the 200 to 500 volumes with which they are equipped. The circulation of these branches during 1920 amounted to 6,170, while so far this year 15,088 books have been taken out from the county branches.

From 50 to 100 volumes are allowed private families who do not live near a branch, who are responsible people and who agree to allow neighbors in the rural districts to share the use of the books. These stations are permitted to keep the books over a period of three months at the end of which time they return them to the central library in Medford and receive a new quantity of reading material for another period of three months. The circulation at these branches was 696 during 1920 and has been so far this year 1208.

A station of 200 books will soon be established at the new consolidated school which will make another noticeable increase in the rural circulation this year.

These large increases in all the departments are largely due to the efficient and strenuous efforts put forth by Miss Van Sant, head librarian, and also by her assistants on the staff of the Medford public library.

## MEDFORD FACED BY INCREASE IN INSURANCE RATE

A. C. Barber, state insurance commissioner and Jay Stevens, manager of the Fire Prevention Bureau of the Pacific Coast met with local insurance agents, City Water Superintendent Davis, Fire Chief Lawton, and one representative of the city council Thursday, and announced that Medford was one of the three towns in the state scheduled for an increase in insurance rates, owing to the lack of adequate fire protection. The increase

will be in the neighborhood of 20 per cent if invoked.

Lack of sufficient pressure, danger of the main over Bear Creek bursting, and no reserve reservoir for use in emergency were given as the chief reasons for the proposed increase. The formation of a Fire Insurance Exchange was also urged by the visitors who are on a tour of inspection.

road of the desert that was used by the defendant in his trips to Eagle Point. Witness said this was about seven o'clock in the morning.

J. N. Robinson, an old man and neighbor of the Matthews testified that with the defendant and his father he had come to Medford, and called on the sheriff and the district attorney, in an effort to get Jacks placed under bonds to keep the peace. Robinson testified that Jacks had

threatened to kill Matthews, and talked about running him out of the country. He said he had told Raleigh of these threats, and was instrumental in the trip to get deceased placed under bonds, the details of which were barred.

The witness admitted that he did not "like the way Jacks acted", and that once he had sworn to a warrant for his arrest for assault on a 17 year old boy. The witness said his suspicions were aroused when he saw Jacks on the desert.

George Adams, a Medford contractor, testified that he had seen a pistol in Jacks' hip-pocket at the Eagle Point dance, and that Jacks had made threats in his presence at a dance in Jacksonville.

Joe Mayhem testified that he had met Jacks on the road shortly before the shooting, and that threats had been made against the defendant's life.

Gus Nichols, a cousin of Mrs. Dolly Jacks, testified that if he told all the bad things he knew about Wilbur Jacks "I will be here all night," and clung to his contention that his general reputation was bad. He testified that the reputation of the defendant was good. Mrs. Gus Nichols and Mrs. Eva Nichols, also testified to the same.

William Perry, a farmer who knew Jacks well, testified to threats, and was asked by Attorney Reames, if "he sometimes did not doubt the sanity of Jacks." The court sustained an objection to this question by the prosecution.

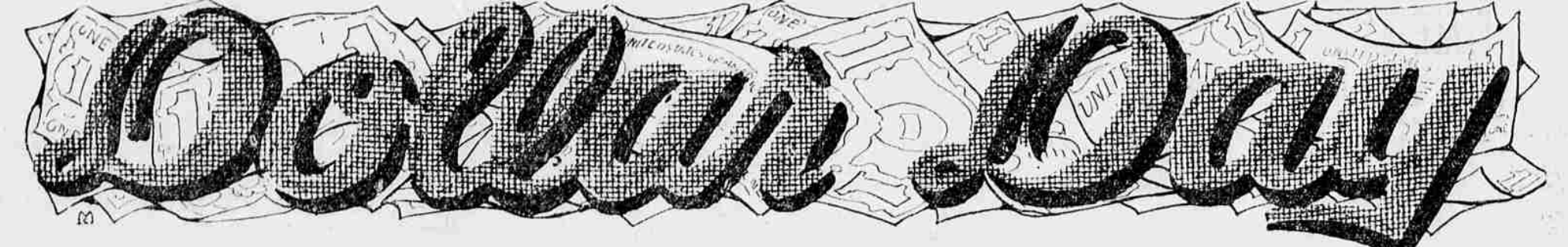
