The motherless little child is about half starved and half-dressed according to the word that comes from Weed. The mother died some time ago, leaving two children. Recently, he took the girl from her custody and left the city, and was next heard from at Weed. Efforts will be made to have the child, who is said to be a very sweet youngster, adopted into a good home, provided the father is found to be insane or incompetent.

KING BILLIARDISTS TO COMPETE FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—Six of the world's leading 18.2 ballline billiard players, representing three nations, will compete in the first international championship tournament staged in sixteen years a week from Monday when Willie Hoppe, the present title holder, will defend his title here in a tournament continuing for eight days.

The contestants will be Hoppe, the champion; Edouard Horemans, the Belgian; Roger Conty, the French champion; Welker Cochran; Young Jake Schaefer, son of the famous wizard; Ora Morainstar and George Stanton.

Total purses aggregating \$6750 have been offered as prizes. Of this amount \$3000 will be awarded the winner. To the runner-up, \$1500 will be given, and prizes of \$1000, \$750 and \$250 will be awarded those finishing third, fourth and fifth.

Games in the tournament will consist of 400 points each unless in the event of a tie for first place in which case 500 points will be played to determine the winner. Three matches a day will be the program until a round robin in which each of the players meets every other player, is finished.

The six who will play for Willie Hoppe's crown have been selected by a tournament committee after a thorough study of the record of the many entrants in tournament and exhibition play over a long period of years.

Four of the players are Americans. Two of them, Welker Cochran and Jake Schaefer, are youngsters who have held their places in the cue hall of fame since they were in their teens.

Edouard Horemans, the Belgian contender, is well known to the American public since his exhibition tour of the states last year. He enjoys the faculty of occasionally turning a 400 point game in one inning and has a series of high runs which compares favorably with the best ever made in the 18.2 game.
