

## SECRET POLICE OF RUSSIA FEARED BY ALL CLASSES

MOSCOW—(By a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press.)—If you see a Cheka agent on the right side of the street, take the left side of the street, the fear instilled by the secret police which is credited here with untold crimes and violence. Its agents look up people, try and control them. If they see it, according to popular information. As there are no police in Russia, it devolves on this organization to keep the peace and, when necessary, control the Red army.

While traveling through the entire length of Russia, the Associated Press correspondent was shadowed from city to city, by these agents, but never bothered by them. As in Turkey, their mission was to prevent the correspondent and his party from reaching the Soviet government in order to prevent complications regarding its treatment of Americans.

That the Cheka keeps order is evident from the fact that there is at present order everywhere in Russia, save for bands of robbers among the Don and Kuban Cossacks, calling themselves the Green army and now and then holding up trains in the region between the Black and Caspian seas, along the line from Rostov to Petrovsk.

## NAVAL HOLIDAY ACCEPTED

(Continued from Page One)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—After the adoption of the program Mr. Balfour spoke. He said in substance: "You have invited those who desired it, to continue the discussions which began on Saturday last. I think it very unfortunate if we are to allow the events of Saturday to pass without some further observation."

"And for reasons which I venture to explain, I am the first to take up the challenge, it is because of all members here assembled the country which I represent is most intimately interested in all naval questions."

"Statements of all countries are beginning to discover that the labor and difficulties of peace are almost as arduous as those required by the conduct of a successful war."

"I congratulate you," said Mr. Balfour, "on the fact that you have added a new anniversary which henceforth will be observed in connection with this movement toward reconstruction. In the minds of all the allies and associated powers... November 12 will prove to be an anniversary... not merely to restore pre-war conditions, but to see that war conditions shall never again exist."

"I count myself among the fortunate among those present," said Mr. Balfour, "referring to the proceedings of Saturday and adding: 'The secret was admirably kept. I hope all the secrets, so long as they may be secrets, will be as well kept.'"

Telling of how he heard Secretary Hughes' proposals, Mr. Balfour said he suddenly realized he was participating in "a great historical event."

"Many in my audience," said he, "are citizens of the United States. The United States stands solidly impregnable with the lines of its communications protected, completely protected from any conceivable hostile attack."

"It is not merely that you have 110,000,000 people;

"It is not merely that you are the wealthiest nation, the geographical situation of your country makes you wholly immune from the perils to which the British empire is subjected."

"Suppose your western states were suddenly removed 10,000 miles across the sea; suppose you found that the heart of your country was a small and crowded island depending on overseas trade, depending on overseas communication for raw materials. Suppose your population never had more than seven weeks food and that this had to be replenished from overseas."

"Then you will understand why it is that every citizen of the British empire, no matter where he lives, can ever forget that it is by sea communication that he lives and that without it he cannot live."

"These references I have indulged in to explain why I am addressing you. We have considered the great scheme laid before you by our chairman. We have considered it with admiration and approval. We agree with it in spirit and in principle. We look to it as being the basis of the greatest reform in the matter of armament and preparation for war that has ever been conceived or carried out."

"I don't pretend of course, that this or any other scheme can deal with every subject... It does not touch the heavy burden of land armament. What it does do is one of the biggest things that has ever yet been done by constructive statesmanship. It does deal with the three great fleets of the world and the proportionment of armament which it lays down for those fleets."

"Taking the battleships as a basis," said Mr. Balfour, "we think the proportions between the various countries are accepted. We think the limitation of armaments is reasonable. We think it should be accepted. We believe thoroughly it will be accepted."

Mr. Balfour suggested that the submarine tonnage might well be reduced and that possibly construction of large

submarines should be prohibited. When Mr. Balfour promised the "full, loyal and complete cooperation," of the British nation toward the general American plan, the audience rose and applauded for a half minute.

"At first glance," said Mr. Balfour, "your experts think that too large an amount of tonnage has been permitted for submarines. They are the most abused agency of the war. The submarine is a defensive weapon of the weak. It might be desirable to abolish the submarine altogether."

"Our experts believe that the submarine tonnage proposed is far in excess of that possessed by any nation."

"I only throw this out as a suggestion—that the tonnage should be further limited. It might be practicable or desirable to forbid altogether those submarines of vast, great size, which are not intended for defense but whose whole purpose is attack and attack by methods which civilized nations abhor."

At that point the audience and delegates again applauded.

"There are other questions," Mr. Balfour concluded, "of replacement of cruisers, which are not required for fleet action. But those are matters for consideration by the technical experts. They don't affect the main structure which the United States desires to exist and which we desire earnestly to help."

"It is easy to estimate in dollars and pounds the savings to taxpayers of each nation which adoption of this scheme would give. It is easy to show that relief will be great; that indirectly it will greatly stimulate industries, national and international and do much to remove the difficulties under which civilized nations labor. All that is a matter of figures, but there is something beyond calculations, something that goes to the root and which concerns the highest interests."

"What does the scheme do? It makes idealism a practical proposition. It takes hold of the dreams of poets, of publicists, even potentates have put it before mankind as the goal to which human endeavor should aspire."

"What makes this scheme a landmark that comes home to the duldest brain and the hardest heart is that the United States has shown that international peace not only is a good thing but that war is horrible and has shown a way to make war impossible."

"In striking the imagination," Mr. Balfour said in closing, "not merely the imagination of those sitting here but of the whole civilized world—you have made the opening of this conference one of the landmarks in human civilization."

Mr. Balfour concluded at 11:15 o'clock amid profound applause, after reading a congratulatory cablegram from Lloyd George.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—With general lines of procedure laid down in committee sessions delegates to the arms conference proposed to hold their second plenary session today at 11 a. m., under an agreement provided for any nation to express its views on the American plan for limitation of naval armaments.

Great Britain's acceptance "in principle" of the American proposal will be announced by Arthur Balfour, head of the delegation, and it also was expected by many connected with the Japanese delegation that Baron Admiral Kato would be prepared to speak Japan's adherence "in principle" as already forecast, at least in statements by him and others of the delegation.

The British acceptance, according to a statement made in behalf of that delegation, while adhering to the basic principle of the American reduction proposal, contemplates a modification in several important details, chief of which, it was said, is for a continuing and more elastic replacement program instead of a flat ten year holiday. In this modifica-

tion the British delegation was expected in Japanese circles here to be supported in the views presented by Japan.

## IRISH SITUATION KEEPS L. GEORGE FROM CONFERENCE

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The crisis in the Irish peace negotiations again in the hands of Prime Minister Lloyd George, the counterproposal made by the Ulster cabinet members having been rejected last night by a British delegation. No further news of the British and Ulster delegates has been heard but the prospects have entered upon a stage which is thought will lead to extended negotiations covering perhaps some months.

This would seem to preclude a later definitely Mr. Lloyd George's hope for an early trip to the Washington conference.

The speaker's efforts will be directed it is thought, toward bringing Ulster into a tentative agreement with the British government and the Sinn Féin. The Ulsterites are holding for independent rule if Ireland is to have a dominion status, while the Sinn Féin delegates who were back in London today declare Ireland must be governmental unit.
