

ANNUAL ROLL CALL REDCROSS BEGAN LAST MONDAY

The Fifth Annual Roll Call of the American Red Cross began in Medford Monday at 1 o'clock when over sixty women, captains and teams, met at the Presbyterian church as luncheon guests of the general committee. After luncheon had been appreciated the chairman, Mrs. W. E. Tully, made a short address and introduced Mrs. Rose G. Schieffelin, who told of the recent regional conference of Red Cross chapters at Albany, at which the problems confronting the organization were considered. Particularly she stressed the post war service and reminded her hearers of Dr. Creighton's statement that the peak of service for ex-soldiers would probably come within five years with the need for aid continually increasing. Home service, home hygiene and care of the sick, public health nursing, and disaster relief, all important departments of Red Cross work were also discussed and Mrs. Schieffelin closed with a plea that we remember that the work is non-sectarian and all-embracing.

Mrs. F. W. Meares was called upon by Mrs. Tully and gave an outline of the plan for Junior Red Cross and for salvage work.

A vote of thanks was given to the committee whose labors resulted in award of the Armistice Day prize to the Red Cross float, and also to the luncheon committee whose work had materialized in a delicious lunch served on tables arranged in cross shape with red outlining the center.

The meetings of captains and teams for final instructions left every one enthusiastic and assured of the success of the roll call which must be finished by Nov. 25.

After singing "America" the meeting was adjourned.

MEDFORD FORUM! GUESTS GRANTS PASS, DECEMBER 5

Following the suggestion of several members of the Medford and Grants Pass Chambers of Commerce, the Grants Pass chamber has invited the members of the Medford chamber to attend a forum luncheon at Grants Pass on Monday, December 5th.

During January the Medford chamber will entertain members of the Grants Pass chamber and it is expected that this interchange of visits will result in a closer relationship of the work of the commercial bodies of these two communities.

Both Grants Pass and Medford have the problem of settlement of lands that are now coming under irrigation. Both communities are obligated to the irrigation districts in their immediate vicinity to see that lands placed under irrigation are colonized. A community may have over so many acres of land under irrigation but unless there are farmers on this land to produce agricultural products, the irrigated lands will be of little value to the communities and create a hardship upon the owner in meeting his obligation to pay the construction cost of the project.

Land settlement is one of the problems of the Consolidated Chamber of Commerce of Southern Oregon, but some definite plan of colonization must be advanced before that organization can constructively take hold and successfully bring about the desired result.

The meeting at Grants Pass will undoubtedly result in some plan being considered.

DISABLED TO GET DAINTIES FROM MEDFORD WOMEN

A committee was appointed to be at the legion hall on Saturday and Monday afternoons, to receive and pack the jellies and jams, to be sent to the disabled ex-service men in Oregon hospitals.

Anyone in Medford who will donate a few glasses of either jelly or jam, is asked to leave them at the hall on Saturday afternoon.

The ladies have a small sum of money raised by card parties, which will be used to give holiday cheer to these men.

"The cause of the disabled ex-servicemen of Oregon will be the first and foremost work of the woman's auxiliary, and any assistance from the citizens of Medford will be appreciated."

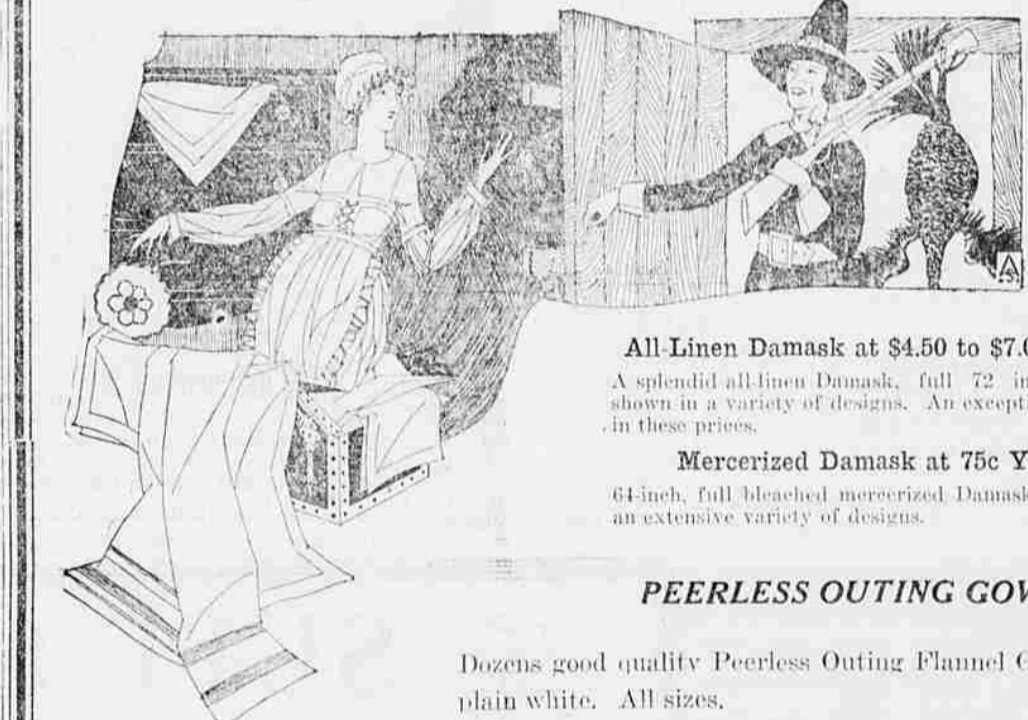
