

# WRANGEL TROOPS SENT TO INDIA, SOVIET PROTESTS

**INDIA, Nov. 15.**—Charges that Great Britain had already transported a number of General Wrangel's followers from Constantinople to Vladivostok, together with rumors that the British were collecting large forces of "White" Russians in Bombay and Bafat, are contained in a statement sent out by the Russian official news agency.

Alford, a British military transport which has already arrived at Vladivostok, states the agency, are 100 Russians, of whom 600 are active in British uniforms and formerly served with Wrangel's or Denikin's forces.

Soviet Russia, according to the agency's report, energetically protests against this act as constituting the Far Eastern revolution, and charges that Great Britain's policy in Lord Curzon's note, approved Russia of breaking the agreement, is merely violating the agreement by equating the enemies of the Far Eastern republic.

What to do with the thousands of Cossack and other Russian troops under command of General Baron Wrangel who were thrown out of the Crimea by the Bolsheviks and took refuge in and near Constantinople, has been one of the puzzles which has perplexed the allied governments of Europe. In April last it was reported that Wrangel had asked the French government to convey his men to Vladivostok.

The Soviet government of Russia has been suspicious that the forces would be used somehow against the Bolshevik government and during the past summer, the official Russian news agencies have put forth several reports that these troops were to be shipped to Vladivostok to aid the new anti-Bolshevik government there or to take the field in Siberia against the Soviet government of the Far Eastern republic with headquarters in Chita.

One of the reports was that Japan had agreed with General Wrangel to move his troops to Vladivostok and that the Russian Soviet government had lodged a protest against it.

Since coming out of the Crimea, thousands of Wrangel's troops have been living in huts in extreme poverty on the Gallipoli peninsula, and the island of Lemnos in the Aegean sea, sustained by the hope that some time

# STANFORD BOWL TO BE DEDICATED AT GAME SATURDAY

**STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 14.**—Up from a rocky soil on the Stanford campus grows the new stadium, the last of six months, with work well advanced. The stadium, one of the largest in the United States, which will be formally dedicated when the two ancient foes, Stanford and California meet in their annual football game Saturday.

Approximately 30,000 people can be seated in the Stanford stadium and it is thought that if the weather is good on the day of the California game every seat will be taken. If the stadium is filled, the crowd will be the largest in western football history.

Only the Blue Bowl, with its capacity for 17,000 people, can handle a larger crowd, according to records here. The Harvard Stadium seats 42,000, the new University of Washington stadium at Seattle, 33,000, the Tacoma stadium 25,000 and a stadium in San Diego 15,000. The stadium being planned by the University of California will be able to accommodate 50,000.

Stanford engineers last May announced the plans for the stadium and made a promise, which was deemed by many to be impossible, that the structure would be ready for the California game 1921 year. The cost of the stadium, a comparatively low figure, \$2,000,000, was announced.

Contractors were in immediately. Stanford men and women provided the funds and in a short time steam shovels were busy excavating out a huge horseshoe-shaped hole twenty-three feet deep. The earth from the excavation was piled on the sides to form a highway for the trucks to haul the material to the site.

The sides were sloped and wooden seats were laid, tier on tier, on the inside, while on the outside were planted shrubs and flowers that bloom in football time each year.

Down on the stadium floor, there is a quarter mile cinder path, with a 220-yard straightaway, a curve football field and an American football field. The playing field is 362 feet long and 155 feet wide.

To handle the huge crowd expected next Saturday, a special railroad depot has been built near the stadium and trains from San Francisco will unload their passengers at the field.

Their services would be needed to re-establish a new government in Russia.

## AMERICA SPENDS MORE FOR FRIVOLS THAN FOR ARMY

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.**—By the Associated Press.—Federal tax returns have been given out to applicants at collection with problems before the commission on limitation of armaments. Mathematicians for the government have labored hard to bring the relative figures as to military expenditures and the amounts spent by the people of the country for amusements and other luxuries on an average that their significance would be seen at a glance.

One set of figures shows that against \$413,000,000 spent for the army, the people expended \$2,000,000,000 for amusements, jewelry, silk stockings and other articles for personal adornment.

The country poured out \$1,151,000,000 for tobacco in all forms. Baseball fans, theater goers, radio listeners and those attending vaudeville paid \$157,000,000.
