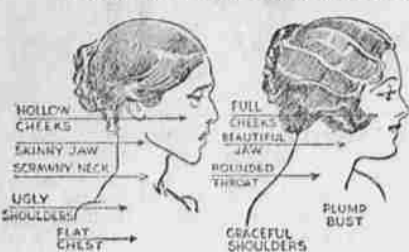

## OREGON FOOTBALL CLASSIC, EUGENE NEXT SATURDAY

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 18.—One of the Pacific northwest's annual big football games—the clash between the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural College for the state title—will be played here next Saturday, November 19.

Approximately 15,000 people are expected to attend. New bleachers to accommodate the crowd, have been built on Hayward field at the state university where the game will be played.

Both teams are busy this week practicing for the game. The "Fighting Aggies," the O. A. C. eleven has been called, were favored early in the season to win, but Oregon stock, which opened low, jumped when the local eleven held the strong Washington State Cougars to a tie.

Saturday's game will be the twenty-fifth played between Oregon and the Aggies. Oregon has won fifteen, the Aggies four and five have been tied. The game will count in both the Northwest Conference and Pacific Coast Conference title races, but will have no direct bearing on the coast fight, for both teams were eliminated early in the season, Oregon by California and the Aggies by Stanford.

## HOUSE IGNORES HARDING'S PLEA ON TAX RATES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The house accepted today the senate 50 per cent maximum income tax rate despite a request from President Harding that the conferees compromise their differences at 40 per cent.

The vote was 219 to 173. The announcement of the result was greeted with handclapping and cheers on both the democratic and republican sides.

Mr. Harding in the course of his letter to Mr. Fordness, which was read before the house today, said he still believed "the rate approved by the house to be the nearer to a just levy and the more promising one in returns to the public treasury." He added that while the administration was anxious first of all to impose taxes that would meet the demands of the treasury, "there is a moral obligation, however, on the party in power to do everything possible to keep faith with the promises made to the public."

A compromise at 40 per cent, the president wrote, "would measurably meet the expectations of those who are above all else concerned with the return of hopeful investment of capital and the application of our capital resources to profitable productivity."

## NAVAL REDUCTION MEANS SAVINGS OF 250 MILLIONS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—(By Associated Press.) Savings in next year's naval appropriation bill should the American naval reduction proposals be adopted were estimated roughly today by congressional leaders and committee experts at from \$200,000 to \$250,000,000.

Sentiment of senate and house leaders seemed close to agreement that if the American proposal were adopted the prospective naval budget of around \$400,000,000 could be cut in half and that the greater part of the annual outlay of around \$90,000,000 for continuing work on the 1916 building program could be eliminated. Greater savings would come through personnel reduction and savings on pay, subsistence, repairs, yards, enlistments, recruiting and training and other items.

## REPORT OF PIONEER'S DEMISE PREMATURE

WENATCHEE, Wash., Nov. 18.—After being given up for dead, having lain all yesterday afternoon and evening in a stupor from which no effort could stir him, G. H. Gray, 90 year old pioneer of Entiat, sat up in his bed this morning and called for his breakfast. He rose and ate heartily. He had been ill during the past six weeks and became unconscious Tuesday and word was sent out that he had died but to the contrary he and Grandma Gray are planning on some more wedding anniversaries.

## INVESTIGATE DEATH OF INSANE MAN

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Nov. 18.—An inquest was ordered today to investigate the death of Lucker Toybinish, an insane patient who died on an Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation train yesterday while being taken back to the state insane hospital at Pendleton from which he had escaped.

He was captured at Portland and his death was reported to have occurred after a fight with his guard, Charles Burnett. Officers ordered Burnett detained as a witness.
