All statistics show that there has been only a 70 per cent crop of apples in the country this year, which estimate also includes Canada. The apples however, were matured earlier than usual and have gone on the market at an earlier date than heretofore. According to J. S. Robinson of Spokane, vice-president and sales manager of the Earl Fruit company, of the Henson, Wenatchee has shipped 3000 carloads of apples and Yakima has shipped 2000 cars. Wenatchee has storage capacity for 6000 carloads and is holding them, and Yakima is holding what it still has. From now on the shipments will not be very heavy. Prices will be higher in the spring, depending, however, on economic conditions. In the east a large red apple is preferred while in Europe the popular apple is small and yellow. Mr. Robinson is one of the authorities on apple statistics in the Pacific northwest—Portland Oregonian.

FRANCE FEARS WAR LORD

(Continued from page one.) said, Germany had grouped together its men available for military ser-

vice "in a marvelous and ingenious way." Former combatant associations were formed in Germany, he continued and marshaled on occasional military anniversaries.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—(By Associated Press.) Aristide Briand, seven times prime minister of France, held the arms conference in a rapid hour today with the world for his audience, while he told of the need of France for a large army. The picturesque "strong man" of France, acknowledged by Lloyd George as having "the finest parliamentary voice in Europe" was the drawing card which packed memorial hall of the Daughters of the American Revolution with such a gathering of distinguished notables as seldom is found under the roof of one building.

The premier's voice, ordinarily vibrant and penetrating, and particularly rich in overtones, modulated to fill the hall and no more. The effect upon the auditor was as though the statesman was speaking directly and personally to him, rather than to a large gathering. There was no display of "cold storage" eloquence.

M. Briand had before him a slip or two of notes, on the big green tables, but he did not refer to them and in this respect, followed his manner of speaking from the tribune of the chamber of deputies.

Five feet six, and heavy of body, the French prime minister was a striking figure, as fired by his own eloquence he pleaded for adequate protection for his native soil.

In introducing the subject of land armament, Secretary Hughes said there was no problem there for the United States, whose traditional policy was to maintain a small army. Secretary Hughes said he took pleasure to state that "gratifying progress had been made during the first week of the conference."

"The United States fully recognizes, however, the apprehensions and difficulties of foreign powers regarding land armament," he said.

"The proposals of the American government regarding the limitation of naval armament," said Secretary Hughes, have been under consideration by the committee of the plenipotentiary delegates and aided by a sub-committee, the matter is progressing favorably.

"I think I am justified in saying," Secretary Hughes continued, speaking with reference to the Far Eastern questions, "that our expectations with reference to the expedition and the consideration of these questions have been more than realized."

Premier Briand, rising to present the views of France, began by saying his government was anxious to take all measures possible to assure a lasting peace.

France could not put down her arms under present circumstances, declared Premier Briand, because of conditions closely touching her national integrity.

He said that because of conditions of instability, France must measure them with reference to the consequences to her own security.

Critics had said, the premier continued, that France sought military ascendancy in Europe, but he asserted the imputation was only a cruel reproach, especially coming after her record in the war.
