ITALY UNAFRAID REDUCES ARMY BEFORE CONFAB

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—(By Associated Press.) Italy has no fear of any of her European neighbors and her sole desire is to have the feelings aroused by the war subside and give way to the spirit of peace, an official spokesman of the Italian delegation to the arms conference said today.

He declared that Italy has not even awaited the call for this conference to begin the reduction of her great army, which now has been brought down to less than 200,000 men. Moreover, the period of military service which before the war was 2 1/2 years, already has been substantially reduced, it was explained, and probably would be cut to eight months.

There was no disposition on the part of Italy, it was added, to question the right of France to maintain a large army, inasmuch as she occupied a peculiar position.
