## CRATERS TO ATTEND FORUM MEETING NEXT WEDNESDAY

The first public appearance of the Craters will take place next Wednesday as they will attend the forum of the Medford Chamber of Commerce in a body.

The particular reason for the Craters attending this forum is in honor of A. B. Carmer, assistant director of Stephen Mather of the national park service and Horace M. Albright, field director of the same service, who will be guests at the forum and be the speakers of the day. The Craters also desire to honor their fellow member, Alex Sparrow and to better opportunity could be presented for that purpose.

The Craters are an organization of young men of Medford who have as their object civic and commercial advancement of the community. ## ASHLAND SUNDAY SCHOOLS TO FORM NEW ORGANIZATION

ASHLAND, Nov. 22.—The Ashland Sunday school Union wounds good, the term breathing the spirit of co-operation in connection with by far the major portion of the Sunday schools of the city, including all the leading denominations. This will be a brand new organization, its chief tenets being the general welfare and mutual helpfulness. All Sunday school officers and teachers will be eligible to membership. Pastors and superintendents are heartily in favor of this movement, as it suggests a "merger" of vital activities the most potent of any single religion and educational influence either in city, state or nation. To further this beneficial project, the success of which is already practically assured, there will be a meeting at the Presbyterian church, on Monday evening, Nov. 28, at 7:30. Churches, schools, and the public in general are all interested in this plan and stand ready to give it steadfast support. It has leaders in reserve, and all that is necessary is to turn out at the meeting, designate this leadership, and place the Ashland Sunday school union on the map.

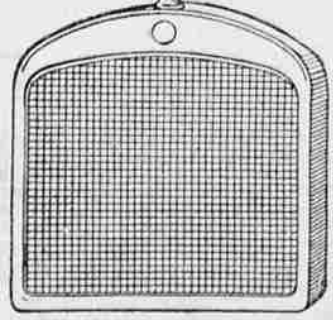

Here is what he says in a letter to the ministers of Oregon: "On Sunday, August 7th, I stood under the shadow of Mt. Ararat. I was in the heaven of one of our orphanages and outside its gates hundreds of children clamored for admission. I helped to bring in twenty (20) and then the gates were closed in the face of hundreds equally needy. During the last four years I have frequently asked you for help which you have gladly given. I am asking you now for larger and larger service. Mr. Handsaker further states that thousands today with whom he frolicked in the orphanages in August are in danger of starvation and look to American benevolence for their safety for the winter."
