

IRISH RIOT AND BOMB FIRST DAY ULSTER REGIME

Age Old Rancor Between Sinn Fein and Nationalists Cause 13 Deaths, 50 Hurt—Lloyd George Meets With Sinn Fein—Prisoners Try Break.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—(By Associated Press.) Dispatches to the London press from Belfast place the blame for the rioting there, according to the sympathy of the respective newspapers. However, while it seems established that the Sinn Feiners were responsible for the bombing of a tram car full of slayard workers late in the afternoon and the consequent death of three persons and injury to thirty, accounts of the disorders suggest that the aggression was reciprocal and due to the ever existing rancor between the nationalists and Orangemen.

AUTO OVERTURNS DODGING CATTLE, THREE INJURED

Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Nelson and L. Gaskill of Spokane, Wash., narrowly escaped serious injury yesterday afternoon when the Eight Six touring car in which they were touring overturned. The accident occurred on this side of Blackwell hill on the Pacific highway. The automobile party was touring south and Mrs. Nelson, it is understood was driving the car. The car met a herd of cattle on the highway and in endeavoring to turn out the car skidded on some clay which has been scattered over the pavement as a result of drainage work along the side of the road and overturned. Mrs. Nelson extricated herself from the overturned car but the two men were unable to free themselves and remained under the car until a man in a wagon arrived and assisted Mrs. Nelson in freeing them. The party caught the south-bound Roseburg-Medford stage and were brought to Dr. Sweeney's offices in this city where the injuries of Mr. Nelson were attended to. Mr. Nelson suffered a broken nose and a cut in his lower lip which penetrated to the gum in addition to other lesions about the face and head. Mrs. Nelson and Mr. Gaskill escaped with slight injury.

The party are guests at the hotel Holland and will remain in this city for a few days pending Mr. Nelson's recovery.
