

MEDFORD HOLDS HEAVY ASHLAND TEAM, 12-0 SCORE

The heavy Ashland team defeated Medford football eleven in the annual Thanksgiving Day game yesterday by a score of 12 to 0. The game was played on the home field which was heavy but not exceedingly slippery from rains. The Medford fight and grit put her within striking distance of the Ashland goal line three times. At the end of the third quarter Medford had the ball on Ashland's two yard line. Luck favored Ashland throughout. Fumbles were infrequent on both teams and passing met with only a fair measure of success. Dick Singler who played end during the first part of the game was taken out because of an injured shoulder which has bothered him all season and Stewart Nicholson was substituted in his place. This was Medford's sole substitution. Three substitutions were made on the Ashland team, one man being taken out of the game because of roughness. Ashland's second touchdown was the result of a fifteen yard penalty imposed on Medford because Johnson, end, on defense made too free use of his hands in attempting to break up a play.

For the first time this year Medford rooters were organized and supported the team in a manner befitting members of a first class high school student body. Ashland rooters and citizens of that city were present in full force and when Medford carried the ball to Ashland's two yard line went frantic imploring the Red and White to "hold."

Men who have watched high school ball in this city for the past ten years were heard to praise the fight and grit displayed by the Medford grid squad.

Officials were Seely Hall and McKenzie, each of whom refereed and umpired one-half of the game.

ARMS PARLEY TO DISCUSS PROBLEMS PERIODICALLY, AIM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—A continuing conference, in which the nations will meet periodically to discuss international subjects is understood to be expected by President Harding to result from the armament conference.

The president is said to have already exchanged views on that subject with some of the foreign delegates here and to have been assured that they regarded such a development as well within the bounds of possibility.

It was also suggested that some of the nations not members of the conference might be asked to express their opinion of the negotiations here before the conference makes its final decisions.

As a first step toward possible realization of Mr. Harding's plan for an association of nations, it was indicated in high official quarters today that nations not represented in the

present conference, including Germany, might be invited to endorse the conclusions reached here.

Whether a continuing conference such as that proposed would be based on binding treaty agreements or would rest simply on an international "understanding" was said to be a question which only the course of the negotiations could answer.

CRIPPLES FLOCK TO CLINIC OF NOTED AUSTRIAN SURGEON

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Cripples—in wheel chairs, in automobiles and on crutches—stormed the hospital for joint diseases today when Dr. Adolph Lorenz, famous Austrian surgeon, held the first of a series of clinics for the city's deformed. So great was the congestion that hospital authorities found it necessary to summon police to handle the crowd.

FEAR TUG WRECKED, FIND PILOT HOUSE COLUMBIA MOUTH

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 25.—Following the finding late yesterday of wreckage from the tug Sea Eagle between Sunset Beach and Fort Stevens, Coast guard crews from point Adams today were patrolling the coast line from Gearheart to the south jetty of the Columbia seeking any further trace of the vessel.

Oars marked Sea Eagle and a mirror were found yesterday afternoon at Sunset Beach and later part of a pilot house, a chair and bed spring were found. The remains of the pilot house were found north of Columbia Beach, near the wreck of the Peter Irdale, which has been on the beach since that vessel was destroyed in 1907.

Captain O. S. Wicklund of the Point Adams coast guard station this morning confirmed the report that the wreckage was marked Sea Eagle. He said the tug must have gotten into trouble off Tillamook head judging

from where the wreckage was found.

The Sea Eagle, which carried a crew of nine was owned by the Red Stack Tug company of San Francisco. The tug had been sent to tow the schooner Ecola into Coos bay. The Ecola was seen off Peacock spit Wednesday night said Captain Wicklund.
