The Western Oil Co., that is sinking a well on the Stokes property, known as the Mundy well, have gone as far as they can with their present tools and have made a contract with Lynch Brothers of Seattle, who are now sinking a well on the Western side with a diamond drill, to complete the hole down to production or 100 feet below a diamond drill provided they can receive aid, and in order to do so the present stockholders have donated 1100 of the 5000 shares of which the company is composed, to be placed on the market at 20 per share. A paper asking the 1100 to subscribe for stock is being circulated and should be liberally signed. This is the pioneer of the present wells and as the owners of the well have spent many thousands of dollars they should receive the liberal support of the people. \$50 or \$100 subscribed by any individual or firm will receive many fold in return if oil is struck here.

UNION SERVICES THANKSGIVING ARE WELL ATTENDED

The union Thanksgiving services at the Christian church were fairly well attended Thursday evening and were very interesting. The male quartet of the Christian church furnished the music and the pastor of the Methodist Episcopal, South Methodist, Presbyterian and Christian churches took part.

The theme of the sermon delivered by Rev. E. P. Lawrence was "Devotion, Household Blessings." Based on the text, Psalms 127:1-2, "If you would prosper and have a fruitful land, if you would possess the land for ever, bless the Lord who is the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel."

He said in part: "Ingratitude is inexcusable. It is stale and flat, it cuts the heart of Jesus to the quick, while gratitude brings joy to every heart it touches. Ingratitude assumes every blessing as its right while gratitude expresses its appreciation all about it."

The Thanksgiving idea originated not with our forefathers, the Pilgrims, but with Moses. He instituted the Feast of Tabernacles as a thanksgiving service of eight days at the close of the fall harvest. David overflowed with the spirit of praise and gratitude as manifest in many of his psalms. The old Romans observed a thanksgiving festival season. The Pilgrims were educated to the idea by witnessing, when they went to Leyden, Holland, in 1609, the thanksgiving festivals of the Dutch in honor of their deliverance from the Spaniards in 1574. They held a dramatic celebration in 1619 in 1575 October 3rd, and every year following.

"Recall if you can the scenes of the journey, the landing, the terrible first winter in America of the Pilgrims. There were many deaths, and great suffering. Supplies of food from England in the fall of 1621. With what joy they could fill and the supplies they had sufficient for their needs. The thanksgiving service which they held has been a memorial to America ever since."

"As a result of war and epidemic many have lost their lives these recent years. We enjoy a host of comfort household blessings which we are only mindful of as we compare them with the inconveniences of a hundred years ago. Over the ditch, the well and old-sunken bucket, the Dutch oven, the tallow candle, etc., are the water faucet, the city bakery, electric range and electric lights."

"A demand for square dealing and fair play is abroad as manifest in the prayer of the Center college football team as they knelt on the gridiron at Harvard before 60,000 spectators and prayed not for victory, but that they might play fair and square. Our high school principals and coaches have been working for the same thing and it has been manifest in all the games this fall in the valley."

"The Pilgrims thanked God for food and so should we. We are blessed with food beyond that of any other nation. Three square meals a day is the most vital need of a man have plenty. The most important thing. Millions are starving while we news flashed over the wires is the annual crop report, which goes out from the Department of Agriculture at Washington each December. The business of the farmer is the highest in America. There are 6,000,000 farms covering 800,000,000 acres employing 14,000,000 men, with an investment of \$60,000,000,000 and an annual average production of \$25,000,000,000."

"The Pilgrims thanked God for peace with Indians at their feast. We thank God for peace yet are conscious that a volcano of hatred and passion may break forth at any time unless this conference at Washington may mark the opening of a new era in world affairs for our nation."

"We are thankful for our nation, her wealth, resources, high ideals. We are glad that she, through our president, could take the lead in calling this conference and pray that out of it may come the fulfillment of the highest hopes of the millions of Europe and America."

"We thank God for the home which is the bulwark of the nation, at the community and church. For the church and her influence in the nation, life and for the splendid spiritual harmony manifest in this city. Last and not least of all for Jesus the Savior of men for His salvation from sin hope of the future and His coming again."

"The grateful heart is a heart that manifests its gratitude in service to God and humanity." An offering for the Armenian orphans was taken at this meeting and amounted to \$18. Its use is to prevent the wires in the circuit protected from carrying more than their rated capacity and to prevent fires and damage to electrical apparatus. Fuses are placed at various points in the electrical circuits where the wires branch or change size; also at the entrance to the building to protect the wiring in the building, and on the pole outside of the building to protect the transformer and outside circuit. When a fuse blows, there is usually a cause for it, such as an overload or damaged circuit and the cause should be found and repaired before replacing the fuse.
