

APOLOGY SENT TO MAYOR BY BARBER ON REALTY DEALS

A letter of apology has just been received by Mayor C. E. Gates from A. C. Barber, head of the State of Oregon real estate department, relative to his having written a "call down" to the mayor in regard to the city selling vacant lots owned by it to ex-service men, and in response to the mayor's somewhat peppery reply. In part the letter follows:

"We are very sorry indeed to have troubled you for this explanation. As explained in a letter to Mr. John H. Carlin, information was given this office that yourself and Mr. Carlin were negotiating real estate transactions for others. As our files did not show that either of you gentlemen were licensed as real estate brokers, it was necessary for us to call upon you for an explanation as to your activities along this line.

"We are sorry that our informant did not explain to us the manner in which your negotiations were being conducted. Had we been familiar with the situation we would not have written either one of you. We take it that Mr. Carlin is your city attorney, hence the information that you and he were negotiating real estate transactions.

"We wish to commend you for the spirit in which you are handling this property for both the city and the ex-service men. Other cities might well profit by your experiences. We trust you will give no further consideration to our letter, and would it be asking too much for us to ask you to impart the same information to Mr. Carlin."

NOVEMBER MEET SCENIC SOCIETY AT TALENT TUESDAY

The November meeting of the Scenic Preservation Association of Jackson county is scheduled to take place next Tuesday evening at Talent. The Ladies' Aid of that city will serve a 7 o'clock supper at the town hall and a very large attendance of residents of Talent and vicinity is anticipated.

This is the first meeting of the association to be held at Talent and a number of very enthusiastic members are located there. Immediately following the 5:00 dinner, the meeting will be called to order. C. M. Thomas will make the address. As Jackson county representatives will be chosen, at the request of Governor Olcott, to meet at Salem or Portland before very long for the purpose of forming a statewide association for the preservation of Oregon's scenery.

Jackson county is just a year ahead of all other counties of the state in making an organized effort toward conservation of her scenic resources and the constitution and by-laws of the local organization was used as a model for the proposed statewide association.

The former meetings of the association have always been held at a noonday luncheon and the one at Talent will be the first to be held in the evening. This is to permit business men who are interested to attend, a number of which will be present from Medford.

NO TRACE FOUND OF MISSING SEA TUG

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 26.—Coast guard and navy radio stations along the Oregon coast today were continuing to watch for any trace of the San Francisco tug Sea Eagle and the schooner Eccla, following the finding yesterday and the day before of wreckage from the Sea Eagle which had the Eccla in tow en route for Coos Bay when a severe storm swept the coast early this week. The Portland office of Balfour, Guthrie and company, owner of the Eccla, has received no word of the schooner, but officials expressed the opinion that the Eccla went out to sea to avoid the storm and may not be heard from for several days. The office had no information on which to base suspicion that the Eccla had been lost. A message from Marshfield today said no news had been received of either schooner or tug, but that marine men there believed the schooner was safe and the tug was lost.

ARGENTINE BANDITS REPULSE MARINES

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 26.—(By Associated Press.) Four hundred well-armed bandits entrenched in the village of Paso Ibanez in the state of Santa Cruz, repulsed an attack by the marines landed from the cruiser Almirante Brown, according to belated dispatches received here. A number of the bandits and marines were killed or wounded during the engagement in which the attackers used machine guns.

The bandits hold prisoner in the village a number of the residents of the region, including English ranchers and S. J. Macleay, manager of the Armour Packing plant near the town of Santa Cruz.

Government reinforcements arrived on a transport at Rio Gallegos yesterday but that point is so far from Paso Ibanez that it is feared a successful attempt to rescue the prisoners will be impossible for several days.

New Ocean Line
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 26.—The Stark Steamship company was authorized by the railroad commission today to issue \$9,500,000 worth of stock to finance its proposed freight service between San Francisco and Portland.

Sport Flashes

OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 26.—Ad Santel, world's champion light-heavyweight wrestler, and Mike Yokel, claimant of the middleweight title, meet here tonight in a finish match.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 26.—Johnny "Kewpie" Ertle, St. Paul bantamweight boxer, will meet Billy Marlowe of New York, at Madison Square Garden, New York, in a fifteen-round bout on December 16. Johnny Buff, bantam champion, has promised Ertle a chance at the title if he receives the judges' verdict over Marlowe.

SEATTLE, Nov. 26.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion boxer, has received an offer from Bill Brennan for a bout at Madison Square Garden, New York, for a "satisfactory purse," his manager Jack Kearns, announced. Kearns said the Brennan offer was

wired yesterday by Tex Rickard. He said nothing would be decided regarding it until the boxer completed the vaudeville tour that brought him here.

PARIS, Nov. 26.—(By the Associated Press.)—Mlle Suzanne Lenglen received qualified approval last night from the council of the French Lawn Tennis federation of her conductance during her recent tennis matches in the United States.

A resolution adopted by the council declared that the doctors' certificates showed that in health must have affected her playing, but "from a sporting view," she should not have abandoned her match with Mrs. Molla Bjurstedt.

NAVY WINS FROM ARMY

At this point the first period ended. Score: Navy 6; Army 0.

After the teams had shifted to the opposite end of the field the Army held on its 20 yard line. On the second lineup Wood punted to Barchet, who ran seven yards to Navy's 48-yard line before he was downed. Unable to gain, Navy punted to the Army's 20-yard line. The rain gained steadily. Two line plunges and an end run were checked by the Navy and Wood punted to Barchet, on the Navy's 45 yard line, who made a fair catch. On the first lineup Barchet swept around Army's right end to the Soldier's 30 yard line before he was checked by French. Army was penalized five yards for off-side play on the third line up, making it first down for the Middles in the Soldier's 23 yard line. Conroy broke through at center of the Army line for an eight yard gain. White here replaced Myers at right end for the Army. A line plunge by Koehler made it first down on Army's ten yard line.

King and Barchet made eight yards in two reverse line plunges. Koehler added a scant two yards and the Navy was given first down in inches from the Army's goal line. On the second plunge Conroy went over for a touchdown. Wood kicked goal. Score: Navy 7; Army 0.

King kicked off for the Army. Barchet catching on Navy's ten yard line and running the ball back to midfield. Three line plunges made it first down on the Soldier's 36 yard line. Conroy broke out and raced to Army's 21 yard line before he was forced out of bounds. Here Clarke replaced Garbisch at right guard for the Army.

Held on the Army's 20 yard line King dropped back for a field goal, but the pass was fumbled at the start and went to the Army on the latter's 21 yard line as a first down. Here the second period ended, the Soldiers falling in the one line plunge made just as the whistle blew. Score: Navy 7; Army 0.

Here Hamilton replaced Cruise at fullback for Navy. The Navy was his 40-yard line and running back to forced to punt, French catching on midfield. On the first lineup French broke through the right side of the Navy line and twice reversing his direction, ran to the sailors' 23-yard line. After a plunge which failed to gain, French tossed a forward pass, which was intercepted by a navy backfield man. The mides put the ball in play on their own ten yard line and in the first scrimmage were penalized five yards for offside play.

The navy could not gain and was forced to punt, the ball going to the Army on the Navy's 30-yard line. Before the teams could line up again the game was ended. Final score: Navy, 7; Army 0.

Time was constantly taken out while the players used a towel, wiped mud off the ball or their hands and faces. Forward pass failing the Army, Wood punted over the Middles' goal line and Annapolis put the ball in play on its own 20 yard line. Running on the slippery turf made

long gains impossible and Barchet punted from his ten yard line to the Navy's 42 yard line. Here the third period ended before the line up. Score end third period: Navy 7; Army 0.

When play was resumed after the minute intermission it was Army's first down on Navy's 38 yard line. A drive into Navy's left wing resulted in a fumble, the ball going to the Middles on their own 36 yard line. Following a punt nullified by a penalty and two ineffectual line plunges, Barchet broke loose around the Army's right end and made it first down on the Soldier's 40 yard mark.

Here the Army held and Barchet punted to Army's 20 yard line. The Navy line was adamant and Wood was forced to punt the ball rolling out of bounds on the Navy's 30 yard line.

After two ineffectual line plunges McKee went in at right halfback for the Navy. McKee punted on the next line up to Army's 35 yard line. After French had made nine yards on one dash the Navy held and Wood punted the ball going to the Army on the latter's 24 yard line.

At the beginning of the third period Army kicked off to Barchet on the 10-yard line and the latter ran the ball back 18 yards before he was checked. Three drives into the Army line gave the sailors a first down on their own 40 yard line. The Army defense stiffened near midfield and Barchet punted to Army's 25-yard line, where French was dropped as he caught the punt.

Weidorn injured his knee and was replaced by Bolles at left tackle. Noyes also replaced Conroy at quarterback for the Navy. West Point could make no impression on the Naval academy line and was forced to punt, the ball being delivered dead on the middle's 39-yard line. On the first lineup Barchet made 16 yards in a drive off tackle, but the Navy was holding and was penalized 15 yards. The mides then punted to Army's 20-yard line. After Wood punted, the Navy was penalized five yards, the ball going back to the Army as the result of the play.

Army was forced to punt, the ball going to Barchet who was downed on the middle's 40-yard line. Steady line plunging gave the Navy another first down at midfield, where Dodd replaced Richards. On the second scrimmage Noyes fumbled, the ball going to the Army on her own 40-yard line.

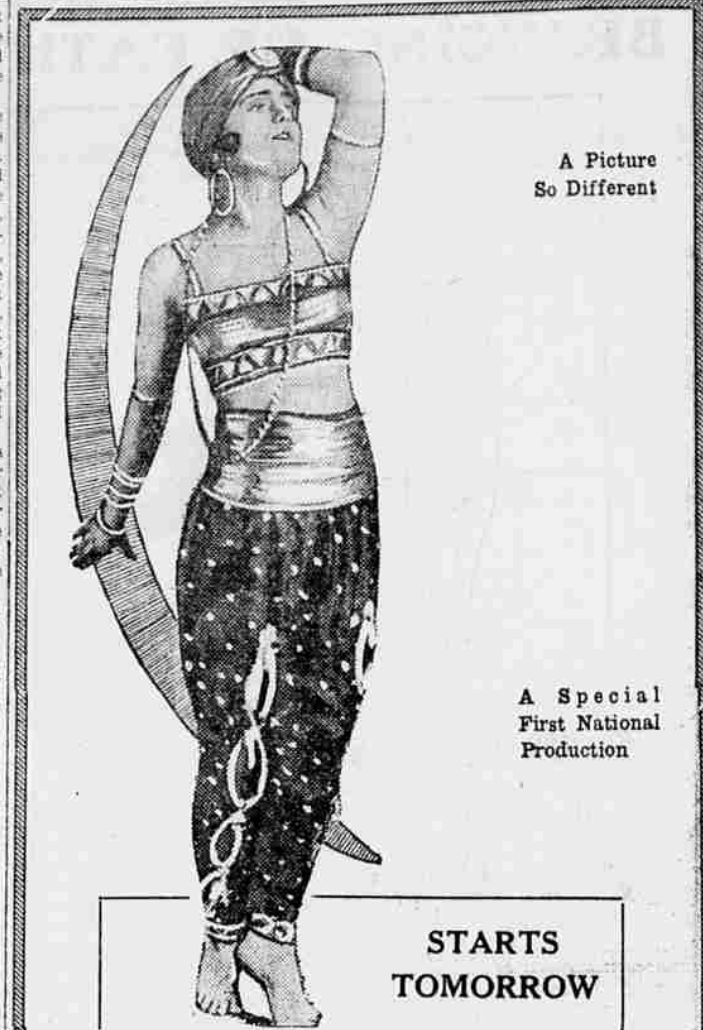
