

DEATH LIST NEW HAVEN MOVIE FIRE 6, HERO IS DEAD

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 29.—Two more persons who were burned in the fire which destroyed the Rialto theater Sunday night died today, making the actual death list six, the coroner having eliminated the name of Timothy Harkin, who was a victim of heart disease. Those who died today were Everett Case and Victor Cortelle, both of this city.

The deaths last night were those of Allen Keith, a Yale sophomore whose home was in Southport, Conn., and Miss Mabel Moran, a telephone operator of Derby, Conn.

Keith, after getting out of the theater unharmed, returned and assisted a number of women out of the place, returning again to search for others. On his last trip inside, which he prolonged in order to grope about in the smoke, he was burned severely. Many Yale students assisted in rescues, it developed today.

ZBYSZKO DEFEATS LEWIS FOR TITLE IN STRAIGHT FALLS

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Wrestling rules of years ago were enforced here last night, and recognition was given the rolling fall which enabled Stanislaus Zbyszko to retain his heavyweight wrestling title in a finish match with Ed (Strangler) Lewis. This old rule, which Zbyszko said has won many matches for him in the early days of his career, provides that when a contestant is compelled in escaping from a hold to roll so that both his shoulders touch the mat momentarily a fall shall be awarded to his opponent. The referee of last night's contest awarded Zbyszko his first fall on this rule when Lewis rolled out of a half Nelson and crotch hold.

Lewis won the first fall last night with a flying bulldog after 17 minutes and 31 seconds of wrestling. Zbyszko was awarded the second fall after 21 minutes 25 seconds and the third fall also of the rolling type, came in 14 minutes, 56 seconds, Zbyszko taking Lewis to the mat with a double arm lock.

The Illinois Central recently put on a fuel saving campaign and word of it was passed to Isiah, an old southern negro, at the pumping station at Phillips Bayou, Miss., in the woods midway between Lula, Miss., and Helena, Ark. The station over which Isiah presides was then using coal at the rate of three wheelbarrow loads a day.

MONTANA PRISON WARDEN 'IN BAD'

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Charging misappropriation of state property approximating \$200,000 and mismanagement of the Montana state penitentiary by former Warden Frank Conley.

The report of Investigator T. H. MacDonald was today submitted to the prison commission by Governor Joseph M. Dixon.

Governor Dixon, just before leaving for a conference of governors at Salt Lake City, recommended to the prison board that some immediate action be taken looking to the restitution of the alleged misappropriated property.

Action on the report probably will be deferred until a full membership of the commission is present. Attorney General Rankin was out of the city today and the report was merely submitted at a meeting of the governor and Secretary of State S. T. Stewart, the other two members.

BEND, ORE., CUT OFF BY SNOW DRIFTS

BEND, Ore., Nov. 29.—Train communication from Bend cannot be resumed short of two or three days, railroad men believe, forty miles of drifts separating crews working from the north and south on the Oregon trunk, with even a greater distance to be cleared on the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company line.

The Oregon Trunk train which stalled at Frieda, November 19, remains snowbound. Telephone service to The Dalles via Prineville and Shaniko was resumed Sunday.

With the except of matter taken from the train by a relief party last week, no mail has reached Bend in eight days. Mail is being routed out of here via Klamath Falls.

NEWLYWEDS AMONG SILETZ VICTIMS

TAPT, Ore., Nov. 29.—Among those who lost their homes and everything in the recent Siletz flood were J. J. Derby, George M. Fucht, Paul Keuhl and Jesse Wheeler, according to latest information from the devastated region.

J. D. Steers and his bride were away from home and when they returned they found the house flooded, all of the stock drowned and everything gone to destruction.

Several large slides are reported on the Schooner Creek road, making it impassable even on horseback.

The beach is strewn with wreckage of the destroyed houses, barns and bridges.

ERIN FACTIONS TO UNITE SOME DAY

LONDON, Nov. 29.—(By Associated Press.) Admission of the possibility that Ulster and the south of Ireland may some day unite "of their own free wills" in the government of all Ireland is ascribed to Sir James Craig, Ulster premier, in an interview published today by the Daily Mirror.

"I do not say that Ulster will never accept an all-Ireland council, though the Sinn Fein says it will never accept any other scheme," Sir James is quoted as saying. "What we said is, let the Sinn Fein first prove its ability to govern itself along constitutional lines. Let it win Ulster's confidence by practical proof of its fairness toward the southern unionists. Then, in the course of time, the two Irish governments might embrace of their own free wills."

Tariff Hearing December 7. WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Chairman Penrose of the senate finance committee announced today that hearings on the permanent tariff bill would be resumed on December 7. The tobacco schedule will be taken up first and the cotton schedule next.
