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PARENT-TEACHERS COUNCIL MEETS

The Medford Parent-Teacher council met at the Library Monday afternoon. Features of the meeting were discussions of various subjects.

Mrs. Carleton Jones, who has recently conferred with the chairman of the Portland council brought back some helpful suggestions. One was that of adopting a uniform program for all of the P-T. A's of the city, thus providing for simultaneous handling of subjects each month.

The chairman, Mrs. George Kunz, called attention to the "Strong Points of the Child Welfare" magazine.

Mrs. Rose Schieffelin explained some of the excellent features of social service work, after which Mrs. Joseph Gray was appointed chairman of a social service committee.

The virtues of a practical curfew ordinance were talked of, the motion being a desire for an improvement in some of the conditions among children of school age; and it was the opinion generally that better discipline, grades and morals would be the inevitable outgrowth of such an ordinance in Medford.

A form of curfew law was read and was thought to be a practical one.
